VICTORIA SPRING ASSIZES. (Before Hon. Mr. Justice Falconbridge.) GRAND JURY PRESENTMENT. May it please your Lordship - The grand jurors of our sovereign lady the Queen assembled at the spring assizes for the county of Victoria beg to present:

They desire to heartily congratulate your Lordship on your relation to the honorable and responsible position you now occupy in the courts of Ontario. Your name has been familiar to the inhabitants of this county for nearly twenty years as a member of the legal profession whose ability and learning would entitle you to an exalted place in the judiciary of the province, and having attained to that distinction they now welcome you in your official capacity and wish you many years of usefulness and honor.

They have visited the county gaol and have found the building and premises in good order. There are eleven prisoners - nine males and two females. One of the women who is imprisoned for a long term for vagrancy, is a poor, feeble, infirm, a great burden to the officers of the gaol, and they find it impossible to give her such proper attention as is needed to prevent her proving a nuisance to the other inmates of the ward in which she is confined.

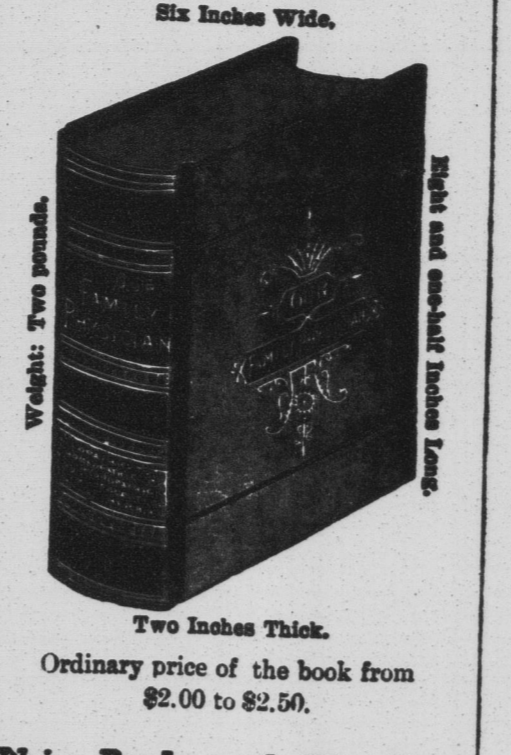

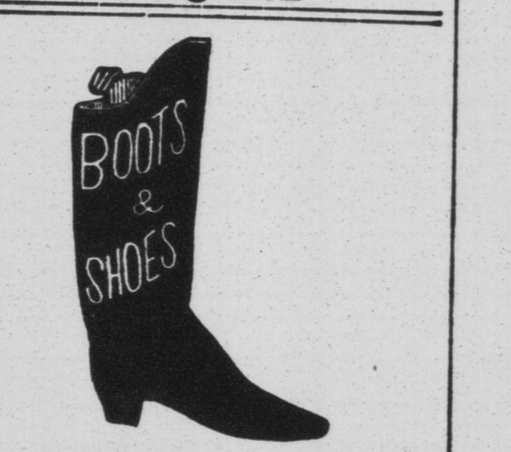
