How was it that this period of four months elapsed after the warrant was issued by the Speaker to the clerk of the crown in chancery before the writ was issued? And the election only took place on the 7th January, 1887. Thus there was a period of five months during which that constituency remained unrepresented. I think the government should account for that delay. They should also account for the undue haste exhibited in the case of the Shelburne election. 
