CANADA'S DEBT-AN OFFICIAL STATEMENT. The statement of the public debt of Can-31st March last by \$299,627. The expenditure for the ten months of the current fiscal year on capital account was \$4,076,966. To THE EDITOR: Compared with the statement of the corresponding ten months in the previous fis-cal year, the net debt has increased by \$2,830,000, while the assets have increased by nearly \$3,729,398. The statement of revenue and expenditure on account of the consolidated fund to the pight of the 30:h consolidated fund to the pight of the 30:h April last shows: Revenue for ten months, \$28,624,132; and expenditures. \$26,004,486. The revenue for April was \$2,914,819, and expenditure \$2,334,200. During the corresponding ten months of the previous fiscal year, the revenue was \$28,160,036, and the expenditure was \$25,985,548. The revenue for April of last year was \$3.071,569, and the expenditure for the same month \$2,112,115. The customs receipts for last month \$1,702,890, which is \$148,000 less than the previous April. Excise yielded \$484,964, which is \$59,000 less than the previous April. Post office receipts show an increase of \$22,000. Public works, including railways, show increased receipts of \$12,000.


