The Empire quotes ordinary wool at 20c. to 21c.; Down at 25c.; and says: "It is expected that the new clip will open very low; as low, if not lower, than last year in sympathy with the American markets."

The American Rural Home of Rochester says: During the past two weeks there has been a still further fall off in the condition of winter wheat. The decline is most marked in those states from which we draw largest supplies. In Illinois the condition of the crop bas retrogaded for the past thirty days, fand now chinch bugs are at work to an alarming extent. The conditions in Indiana are quite similar, and Ohio does not promise a crop exceeding conditions in Indiana are quite similar, and Ohio does not promise a crop exceeding fifteen militon bushels against thirty-seven militons last year. In Michigan, the fourth great winter wheat tate, the crop will run thirty per cent. below last year. Kansas and Missouri report the presence of chinch bugs in large numbers, only kept in check by the told, backward weather. A conservative estimate makes the shortage of the winter wheat crop from sixty to seventy million bushels. Cold weather and excessive rains have delayed spring wheat seeding, but no increase in acrease infindicated. The outlook of the oat crop has materially changed for the better. Corn is not all planted, mins having caused serious delay. Aside from winter wheat the prospects are now favorable for crope generally north of the Ohio river and west of the Mississippi.

Montreal Horse Market.

The horse trade continues active and a bet ter quality of horses are being marketed. The hipments of horses from here to the United States last week were one stallion, costing \$850,

Montreal Live Stock Market. There was a pretty large supply of butcher's pattle on the market Monday, but drovers did ot get nearly as much as last Thursday, and they were generally bare of stock. The best eves sold at about 5c per lb and a few head vere held at 51c per tb. Pretty good stock sold were held at 5½s per fb. Pretty good stock sold at 4½c to 4½c, and common steers and fat cows at about 4c per fb, with leanish beasts down to 3c per fb. Large numbers of small calves are being sold at from \$1 to \$3 each, but good veals would bring much more, as there are very few of them being brought to the market. Sheep are in fair supply, but the quality is not so good and prices are lower. Unshorn sheep sell at from 4½c to 5c per fb and those that have been shorn at from 4c to 4½c per fb. The supply of lambs is small and the quality is not very good and prices are from \$3 to \$450 each. The supply of hogs is rather small and prices continue about as high as usual or from 6½c to a little over 7c per fb.

East Buffalo, May 14.—Cattle—The offerings

of cattle to-day were 135 cars, with a brisk demand. The sales were rapid and the offering did not nearly suffice to fill the demand. About a dozen Pennsylvania buyers came on a late train, after all the stock had been sold, and buyers here received orders by telegraph after all the offerings were taken. Trade was remarkably active. Eastern markets were reported good and both exporters and shippers were buying. The grades most in demand were Michigan shippers of 1,200 to 1,400 pounds, and of these but a limited supply was on hand. All nandy steers of good quality were 10c to 20c handy steers of good quality were 10c to 20c higher than last Monday. Prices of mixed butchers' and common stuff were strong to a shade higher. Prices closed: Prime export weights, 1,500 hs upwards, \$5 to \$5 25; good do, 1,300 to 1,400 hs \$4 60 to \$4 85; prime shipping steers, 1,200 to 1,300 hs, \$4 50 to \$4 75; good do, 1,100 to 1,200 hs, \$4 40 to \$4 65; good butchers' steers, 1,000 to 1,100 hs, \$4 25 to \$4 50; light butchers' stock, 900 to 1,000 hs, \$3 90 to \$4 15; mixed butchers' stock, cows and heifers, \$3 75 to \$4; common to fair cows and heifers, \$3 25 to \$3 50. Ten loads of stockers and feeders were offered, nearloads of stockers and feeders were offered, nearly all from Canada. They were in good demand and sold early at steady prices; most of the stock sold at \$3.60 to \$3.75. Feeders, 700 to 900 hs, \$3.40 to \$3.90; stockers, 750 to 800 hs, \$3. to \$3.50; veals in good demand and light supply; price. 25c higher on the choicest but steady on the lighter weights; all sold readily; a few extra sold as high as \$5; veals, 100 hs, \$3. to \$3.50; to \$4.75; more milch cows and springers than usual among the receipts; there were probably over fifteen loads, mostly from Canada; prices declined \$3. to \$1 per head from last week on most of the stock, but a few choice sold well up to last Monday's figures.

The Egg Market. Eggs firm; supply light; combine price remains at 12c and the general price at 121c to 13c. No round lots obtainable excepting for immediate consumption.—[Empire of Tuesday.
