Few except those engaged in the trade have any idea of the magnitude of this business. It would amount to very little if eggs were shut out of the American marke.

The warm weather has come at last to stay. Vegetables will now make some progress. The season is opening most favorably. A warm shower or two with in a few days would be most beneficial. The Toronto Egg Market.


