A meeting of the Lindsay board of education was held Tuesday evening in the police court chamber at eight o'clock. Members present. Mr. Adam Hudspeth, chairman, and Messra. McNeillie, Cerneil, Dobson, Kennedy, Stewart, Winters and Walters. The secretary read the minutes of the last regular and special meetings, which were confirmed. The high school report for May was presented, showing 213 on roll—106 boys and 107 girls—average attendance, 197. Also report of public schools for May, giving 660 as the number of pupils on rell, with an average attendance of 607. Communications were read from Messrs. R. Widdiss and A. Cullon, complaining of the treatment of their sons by Headmaster Hallett, and giving details.
