Farmers in England are fully convinced that he possesses all the bad qualities that he has been charged with here, and have set to work systematically to rid themselves of him and his brood. In various counties, but especially in Cheshire, boys are making wages out of prize money that is paid by the authorities—six cents a dcz n for heads and eggs. The Farmers' Club, of London, has atted the case against the sparrow, and nobody has ventured to make reply. He is quarrelsome, noisy, dirty and greedy; he plays havoc in the garden, from the crocus bed to the green pea vines. He drives away the really insectiverous birds, and then lives at the expense of the garden and kitchen, leaving the caterpillars and other pests to increase as they never did before. It is seriously stated that the sparrow causes a loss to agricultural England of from forty to fifty million dollars per year.

The audience was much moved by his graphic description of the persecution of Irish members in prison, and his impassioned declaration, "If this is the law, I will obey the law, and not shrink from the law, but respect the law, no, never," which he delivered with fine effect, produced quite a frer sy of enthusiasm...Lord Cadogan's motion for a committee to report on the standing orders of the house of lords is understood to be a preliminary step with a view to the introduction of Lord Salisbury's bill for the reform of that body, which will be brought forward next week. Lord Salisbury proposes to create life peers and give power to the upper heuse to exclude its own black sheep.
