GRAND JURY PRESENTMENT. May it please Your Honor:

May it please Your Honor:

We, the grand jurors of our sovereign lady the Green, now assembled at the general sessions of the peace for the county of Victoria, beg respectfully to present as follows: That we as is customary have visited the gael, and found therein twelve prisoners. The prisoners are made up as follows: 2 for assault. 1 for larcany, I female inmate of a house of ill-fame, 3 vagrants, 5 lunatics, three of them are males and two females. It is to be regretted that there are so many lunatics at present in the gaol, Several of them have already been there for a considerable length of time, while the

proper place for them is the asylum, and the proper place for the vagrants is the hospital, as they are all suffering under some form of disease. We would more particularly draw attention to the case of one of the women, who is simply imbecile and helpless; also the case of a young man who is totally helpless from paralysis, and whose removal we would urgently request, as his board and care can be obtained for two dollars weekly. The retention of some of those prisoners in the common gaol does not only entsil to the officials an extra trouble but is a source of danger, and a common gaol does not afford the necessay facilities for the proper treatment and care of lunatics. We found all parts of the gaol in such a state of order and cleanliness as reflects creditably on both the gaoler and his staff. According to the inspector of prisons' report of 18th of May of this year an improvement is absolutely necessary in connection with the ventilation of the sewer. We find that this is also spoken of in his report of 1883, which, as constructed, has its escape at the surface of the ground in the gaol yard. We are also of opinion that some more effective method of flushing the sewer should be adopted as quickly as possible.
