-The fatal illness of the Emperor Frederick is thought by some to be traceable to an attack of meagles from which he suffered rather more than a year and a half ago. Although it is well known that abiding delicacy, and even definite disease of the air passages may be induced by this complaint, no distinct connection has, we believe, been made out in the present case between the acute fever and the local malady which follwed it at a considerable interval of time. These about him, however, noticed that after his recovery from messles he never fully regained the buoyancy of spirit and keen jenjoyment of life which had distinguished him before. In the autumn of 1886, when out for a drive with the King of Italy in the Tyrol, he was caught in a heavy shower, and, having no overcoat, got wet through. This missadventure resulted in a very severe cold, which he never quite succeeded in shaking off. In January, 1887, his voice became very hoarse, and it was thought that he had again taken cold. As, in spite of treatment, the hoarseness continued to get worse, Dr. Carl Gerthardt, professor of medicine in the university of Berlin, and a physician of great experience in diseases of the throat, was asked to see him in the month of March. That gentleman discovered a small growth attached to the vocal cord of the left side; this excrescence hindered the free movement of the cord, and thereby blurred the tone of the voice and caused hoarseness. Prof. Gerhardt proceeded to apply the electric cautery to the growth, and in this way he succeeded in destroying the greater part of it. All seemed to be going well, and in April the emperor went to Ems for a course of the waters. While there, however, the hoarseness became worse than ever, and the tumor was found to be growing again. It increased in size so rapidly in spite of repeated applications of electric cautery that Dr. Tobold, a distinguished specialist, and Prof. Von Bergman, the leading surgeon in Berlin, were called in. The disease was pronounced to be cancer, and a surgical operation, involving certain loss of voice and the most serious risk to life, was declared to be necessary. the air passages may be induced by this
