—It is believed, after a definite under-standing with Russia has been arrived at, Emperor William will propose that the European powers reduce their armament. —A stage coach, running between San Francisco and Hildrith, was stepped by masked robbers on Monday and the express box containing \$10,000 in silver, was taken.

—Arabella McDonald, arrested last Tuesday for bigamy, received a light sentence from Magistrate Flint of Belleville, owing to the psculiar circumstances of the case. She married Zimmerman while in a frolic and never lived with him. She was confined to gaol, to be released on Friday.

Toronto Live Stock Market. The receipts of cattle at the local market continue modest, there being only some 6 loads in Tuesday. Among these there were only a couple loads of shipping cattle, the majority being medium and inferior beasts. It is difficult to get choice beeves and good prices would be paid. Exporters are quoted at 5c to 5½c per lb for prime, and at 4½c for grass-fed. Bulls sell at 3½c to 4½c, and milch cows at \$35 to \$45 a head. There is a good demand for choice butchers' stock, but none can be had; the best are quoted at 4½c to 4½c, medium to good at 3½c to 4c, and inferior at 2½c to 3c per lb. Sheep are steady, there being a few sales at 3½c to 3¾c per lb; the best bring \$5 50 to \$6 a head, and medium \$4 to \$5. Spring lambs in fair supply and the demand moderate; prices steady at \$2 50 to \$4 00 a head. Calves in fair demand and prices steady; good to choice bring \$7 to \$8 a head, or about 6c to 7½c per lb dressed, small calves \$3 to \$4 50.
