There is not the least likelihood of what you apprehend happening." Mr. Parnell said it might be genuine, but he could not recollect it. As to Egan's letter of October 25 h, 1881, to Carey, saying, "I sent you £200. When you get to work give us the value of our money," and which Attorney General Webster stated the police found in Carey's house, Mr. Parnell eaid that doubtless genuine letters from Mr. Egan were found there, but Mr. Ezan had never been legally charged, and he had sent a cablegram denying the authorship of the letters attributed to him Mr. Parnell denounced as an explanation concerning certain statecharged, and he had sent a cablegram denying the authorship of the letters attributed to him. Mr. Farnell denounced as an absolute forgery the letter which it was alleged he wrote, and which it was claimed was smuggled from Kilmainham gaoi to Egan, urging him to immediate action, and to make it hot for "old Forster." He never wrote, signed, saw, nor authorised the communication. Mr. Parnell then reierated his assertion that he had neither signed nor author sed the letter dated May 15, 1882, which hore what was alleged to be aigned nor author sed the letter dated May 15, 1882, which bore what was alleged to be his signature and which was published a year ago. He said he had not used a signature similar to the one attached to this letter since 1879. He had then adopted a different style of signature. ("Oh!" from the ministerial benches) The letter of June 16th, 1882, was also a forgery. The Byrne letter was doubtless genuine, but he had never sent Byrne any money. He had aubscribed a small amount to the Byrne testimonial. "The great majority of the letters read at the trial," Mr. Parnell continued, "are palpable forgeries. If they are credited, it must be supposed that I deliberately put myself in the power of a murerately put myself in the power of a mur-derer, that I was accessory to the Pheenix park murder before and after the fact, and that I entered Kilmainham gaol desiring to assassinate Mr. Forter. The absurdity of the whole series of letters, with a fexceptions, shows them to be forgeries."

-A London cable to the Montreal Star eays: The opinion gains ground that the action of Mr. O'Donnell against the Times was a collusive suit brought merely to enable the proprietor of the Times to go into court and attempt to blacken Mr. Parnell. The fact that Mr. O'Donnell refused to go on the witness s:and, taken in connection with the declaration by the defendant's counsel that Mr. O'Donnell was afraid to with the declaration by the defendant's counsel that Mr. O'Donnell was afraid to do so, because, while innocent himself, he would have to implicate others, was thought remarkably odd. The chief justice scemed to have a strong surpicion in the matter, judging from his ironical observations to the effect that the plaintiff's counsel had brought the case forward in the best possible way for his adversaries. Among the letters read in the suit was one from Patrice Egan, in Paris, while he was treasurer of the league, dated February, 1881, in which he said: "Mr.Parnell is here. Afterwards Mr. Egan wrote: "Parnell accepts the offer made by B," (meaning Brennan.) The reading of this caused a sensation. Inaction is inexpedient. Our best men are in prison. Nothing has been done. End this hesitancy. Make it hot for old Foster."
