Willock and Duncan Ray. A number of ladles showed their deep interest in ber of ladles showed their deep interest in the proceedings by accompanying the delegation. A petition signed by 275 members and one signed by 186 adherents of the church were presented and read to the presbytery. These documents set forth in clear and definite terms the reasons of the campregation why their reasons of the clear and definite terms the reasons of the congregation why their pastor should not be taken from them. Petitions were also presented and read from the W.F. M.S., the Sunday School and Young People's Christian Circle of the church, and from the Y. M. C. A. of the town, all asking in earnest terms that Dr. McTavish should be allowed to remain in his present reserves. allowed to remain in his present pastorate. Following the presentation and reading of the petitions came addresses from nearly all the members of the delegation, which all the members of the delegation, which for cogency and earnestness have probably seldom teen excelled before any presbytery on a similar occasion. On the other hand the case for the Toronto Presbytery and congregation was strongly urged and well put. The Toronto presbytery was represented by Revs. John Neill and Wm. Patterson, and the congregation by Messrs. Anderson, Donaid, Meldrum and Wilson. On the call having been placed in by Messrs. Anderson, Donald, Meldrum and Wilson. On the call having been placed in Dr. McTavish's hands he signified his acceptance. He felt a great difficulty in deciding the matter. To his congregation in Lindsay he was much attached, and had received the utmost kindness and comaideration in his going out and coming in among them. There was a fine field there for the energies and efforts of the most developed pastor, and these efforts, so far as

in t pastor, and these efforts, so far as his experience went, were uniformly seconded with reciprocal devotedness and faithfulness. To sever the tie which bound faithfulness. To sever the tie which bound him to such a people was no easy matter, but when what he believed to be the call of duty came he could not decide to shirk it. Dr. McTavish then intimated that he accepted the call. While the mind of the presbyery was decidedly in favor of Dr. McTavish remaining in Lindsay no other course was open to them than to release him from his charge... DR. M'TAVISH'S CAREER. The Mail gives the following sketch of the career of Rev. Dr. McTavish: The minister-elect of the Central Presbyterian church is yet a young man, and is known as a scholar of broad and liberal culture. He was born in the township of Beckwith, Lanark county, and at any early age moved with his father to the township of Sullivan, county Grey, where the latter until his death was engaged in farming. Dr. McTavish taught school for three years, but having strong convictions that he ought to devote himself to the work of the sattech, he abendered school teaching

in 1876 and entered upon a course of studies at Galt collegiate institute, under the celebrated Dr. Tassie, then principal of the school. In the fall of 1876 he entered Queen's university, having taken a scholarship at the matriculation examination then held. Throughout his university course he was known as a student of brilliant attainments, and succeeded in winning prizes, scholarships and other distinctions. He was loved by his fellow-students, because he impressed them with his piety and unostentatious habit of inculcating the precepts and teachings of christianity. In arts he obtained successively the degrees of B.A., M.A., D.Sc., and in his theological course he was equally successful, having succeeded in passing the examination for Bachelor of Divinity. Before concluding his divinity course St. Andrew's church, Lindsay, was vacant, but so much were they impressed with the doctor's preaching that they decided to postpone giving a call to a minister until he was licensed to preach. He has labored there during the last five years with marked success, young and old being much attached and devoted to their pastor. Lindsay High School. To the Chairman of the Board of Education, Lindsay:

DEAR SIR,—In presenting my last report for the half year just closed I thought it would be well to take a brief review of the standing of the school for the half year, in addition to the statement of the attendance for the month of June, which was 158. The low average for the month of June was largely caused by many pupils who were not preparing for this year's examinations leaving before the term had closed. During the half year 213 pupils were in attendance, 107 boys and 106 girls, 113 from town, 82 from county of Victoria and 18 from other counties; 133 had bean in attendance the previous half year and 80 were either new pupils or old pupils who had been absent for one or more terms. The average attendance for the past half year was 167. This average is low in comparison with the total number on the roll. I have before me the yearly report for 1837 of a school whose attendance on roll for full half year was 135, average, 121; second half year, 121, average, 112. At the same rate our average should have been 195. This school has an annual fee of ten dollars, and I have no doubt that the payment of this fee has much to do with the regularity of its attendance; and as nothing tends so much to retard the progress of a school as irregularity of attendance; ledieve that we shall find the fee a great assistance in securing regular attendance and steady progress. If a comparison be made with the attendance of previous years the attendance for the past half year is quite satisfactory, as the following table will show:

AN IMPORTANT APPEAL.—In the case of the North British Insurance Co. of Montreal against Messrs. Peter Murray and Andrew Black of our town on a guarantee bond given by them, the judgment of the tull court was given last Friday, June 29th, on the appeal made by the plaintiffs from the decision of Mr. Justice Falconbridge given at Barrie last spring in favor of the defendants. On the appeal the court were unanimous in dismissing the same and confirming the judgment. The case is one some public interest, as the question raised in it for the defence was raised for the first time in Canada, and the decision will affect, as was said by the plaintiff in the action, nearly a quarter of a million of bonds. The particular point raised on behalf of the defendants, upon which judgment was given, was that notice must be given by the persons who accept the bond to the sureties who give the bonds, notifying the sureties that the bond has been accepted, otherwise no liability is attached. This suit has been pending before the courts for over a year and a half, and the defendants are to be congratulated on having escaped with such perfect success from a tedious and expensive law suit.
