COMMERCIAL NEWS. OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, LINDSAY, AUG. 3, 1930. Business and Produce. Farmers are hard at work harvesting, which is turning out better than they anticipated. Matters are quiet in town in consequence, and will be for the month.

Official reports on the Russian harvest state that wheat will be an excellent crop, 30% above the average and the yield of oats and barley fair.

Buffalo Live Stock Market. EAST BUFFALO, July 30. -To-day the offerings of sale cattle were again liberal, consisting of 210 loads of fresh stock and about 15 loads held over from Saturday's trade. The market ruled dull and slow for most of the day, but a decline of 15 to 20c. from last week's prices, their being altogether too many of this class of cattle on sale. Good to choice heavy shipping and export steers were in fairly good demand and steady at last week's prices, but there could have been sold had they been here, but a number of loads of common cattle were held over, and for this kind the prospects are no better than for some time past. Sales ranged, good to best export steers, \$5.50 to \$5.75; good shipping, 1.275 to 1.400 lbs., \$5.10 to \$5.40; fair to medium, 1,100 to 1,250 lbs., \$4.65 to \$5.00; stock beefers, 1,000 to 1,100 lbs., \$4 to \$4.50; while some of the light, butchers' stock sold down to \$3.25. Steers and feeders - Records were somewhat better than for a week or two past, and nearly all were sold. Good to choice heavy shipping and export steers, \$5.50 to \$5.75; good shipping, 1.275 to 1.400 lbs., \$5.10 to \$5.40; fair to medium, 1,100 to 1,250 lbs., \$4.65 to \$5.00; stock beefers, 1,000 to 1,100 lbs., \$4 to \$4.50; while some of the light, butchers' stock sold down to \$3.25.

Montreal Live Stock Market. There were about 300 cattle, 920 sheep and lambs, 74 calves and 141 fat hogs offered at the East End abattoir Monday. Trade was fair and quiet. There were no material changes in the prices of cattle last week. Several superior fat oxen were bought by shippers at 5c. per lb. but very few butchers' cattle were sold at more than 4c. per lb. and pretty good fat cows and thirty sheep were sold at 3c. per lb. with common stock at 2c. 10c. and less beans down to near 2c. per lb. Calves were in active demand, especially good veals, and prices of these are pretty high. Mutton crippers were in good demand, but prices of butchers' stock were not quite so high as they were last week. Sheep sold at from \$2 to \$3 each and lambs at from \$2.25 to \$4 each, only very fine lambs bringing \$4. Mr. J. B. Bourassa bought Monday thirty-four lambs at from \$2.50 to \$4 each and twelve calves at from \$8 to \$10 each. Fat hogs are slightly higher in price, or from 6c to 6 1/2c per lb. for fed hogs and 57 for those just come off the cars.

Montreal Horse Market. The receipts of horses at the Montreal horse exchange, Point St. Charles, for the week ending July 28th were as follows: 73 horses; left over from previous week, 68; on hand for sale and shipment, 18; left stables for city, 20. The arrivals of thoroughbred and other imported stock at these stables for the week and shipped per G.T.R. were: Six horses; eleven horses, consigned to Nees of Howick, Quebec, the market was very dull, there being few horses on hand for sale and the demand slow. The prospects for next week are better; there is some demand for heavy horses for sale and for shipment. Horses are expected from the west next week. During the past week the shipments from Montreal to the United States were thirty-three, costing \$792, or an average of \$112.53 each. The highest price was \$140 for a pair of heavy horses.
