The market ruled dull and slow for common to fair grades of butchers' and shippers' stock, at a decline of fully 15 to 20c. from last week's prices, their being altogether too many of this class of cattle on sale. Good to choice heavy shipping and export steers were in fairly good demand and steady at last weeks' prices, and more could have been sold had they been here, but a number of loads of common cattle were held over, and for this kind the prospects are no better than for some time past. Sales ranged, good to best export steers, \$5.50 to \$5.75; good shipping, 1,275 to 1,400 lbs, \$5.10 to \$5.40; fair to medium, 1,180 to 1,250 lbs, \$4.65 to \$5; good butchers', 1,000 to 1,100 lbs, \$4 to \$4.50; while some coarse and light butchers' sold down to \$3.40 to \$3.85. Steekers and feeders—Receipts were semewhat heavier than for a weak or two past, and searly all were from Mishigan. Demand was better, where whelm a fairly good attendance of buyers. Prices were a trifle better and sales generally thinged at \$2.75 to \$5, with a few good stockers at \$3.10. Advices of July 21 from Edinburgh state Supplies of home fat cattle throughout this week have been, time of year considered, large. Trade generally has been in favor of buyers. There was little demand from England, grass fed cattle principally supplying the markets there, and the quo tations here leaving no room for speculation. There was a considerable number of Irish grass-fed cattle on offer of a very high class, but the rates in the Irish markets are just as nearly as possible as high as they are here. The number of sheep on offer has been about an average. For nice shop sheep prices have been well maintained; ewes were the turn lower. Best lambe in active demand at full prices, secondary in active demand at full prices, secondary cheaper. The supply of store cattle has been small, and anything of a fair description has been selling well at quite previous rates. At the first of the lamb markets the quality of the lambe on offer was, considering the season, surprisingly good. With the largest attendance of buyers of late years, trade began and continued uniformly good to the end, with the market in favor of sellers towards the finish. The average general rise would be 2s 6d to 3s. Foreign supplies for the week have been the lightest for many years, there being no Canadian arrivals and only 220 States cattle, Danmark being also nominally unrepresented. Trade for States cattle is, therefore, reported to have been good. For next week 700 Canadian and 350 States cattle are advised. For milk cows trade cattle are advised. For milk cows trade was one of the dearest of the season. Fat 1½d per lb. less. Pigs maintained previous prices. Top prices of the best beef 8s to 8s 3d per stone; secondary, 7s 6d to 7s 9d; bulls and cows, 6s 9d to 7s. Top prices of best mutton, 8½d for nice weighted sheep and 7½d to 8d per lb for heavier weights; halfbred lambs to 37s 6d and greyfaced to 32s.

There were about 300 cattle, 920 sheep and lambs, 74 calves and 141 fat hogs offered at the East End abbatoir Monday, Trade was fair and quiet. There were no material changes in the prices of cattle last week. Several superior fat oxen were bought by shippers at 5c. per 1b, but very few butchers cattle were sold at more few butchers cattle were sold at more than 4c per lb and pretty good fat cows and thrifty steers sold at 3½c per lb, with common stock at about 3c and lean beasts down to near 2c per lb. Calves were in active demand, especially good veals, and prices of these are pretty high. Mutton critters were in good demand, but prices of butchers' stock were not quite so high as they were last week. Sheep sold at from \$3 to 36 each and lambe at from \$2 25 to \$4 each, only very fine lambs bringing \$4. Mr. J. B. Bourasea bought Monday thirty-four lambe at from \$3.50 to \$4 each and twelve calves at from \$6 to \$10 each. Fat hogs are slightly higher in price, or from 6½c to 6½c per lb for fed hogs and \$7 for those just come off the cars.
