

ANITARY MATTERS-THE DOG TAX-NEW BUILDING PERMITS-THE TOWN "OR-PHAN"-MAYOR WALTERS REPLIES TO MR. FEE-DRAINAGE MATTERS - THE

TEST WELL-COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The town fathers met on Monday evening at eight o'clock sharp for the transaction of public business. The handsome council chamber was well filled with ratepayers, and guesses were hazarded as to their assembling in such unusual force to listen to the remarks of their representatives. Some had it that the cause was the rumored likely repeal of the dog bylaw: others that a court martial was to be held on the d. g. cart; but these speculations were received with little credence. It is a noticeable peculiarity of Lindsay ratepayers that for nine months in the year they manifest a good deal of indifference as to the manner in which their representatives deal with town affairs and make themselves conspicuous by their absence at every meeting; but just as soon as voting time is within hailing distance they flock to the hall of wisdom in force and watch the business being transacted with the keenest and liveliest interest. This zeal if distributed over a wider area would produce better results. The rate-payers would have a much better knowledge of what has been done during the

year.

The members present were: Mayor Walters, Reeve Walters and Couns. Dr. McAlpine, Ray, Brown, Fisher, McGinley, Connolly, Winters and Crandell.

The minutes of the last meeting were

COMMUNICATIONS. The following communications were read by the clerk:
From "A Merchant," relating to the nen-fulfilment of the regulations of the early closing by-law, and asking that the same be either enforced or repealed.—Not

given.

From Mr. W. Cowan, relating to assessment of \$17,000 on stock formerly held by him, and disposed of by him as assignee to M. J. Carter & Co. It was held that the assessment was excessive in view of the

assessment was excessive in view of the fact that a large amount of money was due upon said stock when the assessors went round.—Received and fyled.

From F. Kean & Co., making application for permission to erect an addition to their store in Keenan's block of 22x30 ft., said addition to be of frame covered with fire-proof iron sheeting and painted with fire-proof paint.—Laid on table.

From H. Hughes, fire warden, detailing proceedings taken by him to enforce the provisions of various by-laws.—Referred to fire and water committee.

o fire and water committee.
From the sanitary inspector reporting steps taken to preserve the sanitary wellbeing of the town, which was very satis being of the town, which was very satisfactory at present. Incorporated in the report was a statement from John Hartwick, town scayanger, to the effect that he had made the rounds three times to collect refuse and had not obtained a barrefull in all. The people gave the excuse that they fed all the refuse to cows.—Referred to sanitary committee.

A petition was handled warily by the clerk which bore the signatures of 301 rate pavers, praying for the repeal of the dog

clerk which bore the signatures of 301 rate-payers, praying for the repeal of the dog tax upon the ground that the taxes levied were already very heavy, and asking that money paid into the treasury on this head should be refunded....It was proposed to refer the petition to the legislative com-mittee, but Coun. CRANDELL rose up and mittee, but Coun. CRANDELL rose up and said the matter had been hanging fire for some months and he feit like tackling the subject. He understood that the dog tax had to be paid in by the 12th August; he had asked the clerk and found that not a dollar had been paid in by that date. One or two things would have to be done—either the dog tax by-law should be repealed or the officers whose duty it was to enforce it should be dispensed with for neglect of duty. If deemed advisable to refer to a committee he would like a committee appointed for the purpose, and refer to a committee he would like a committee appointed for the purpose, and named Reeve Walters, Couns. Dr. McAlpine, McGinley and Connolly, the mover's name being added on suggestion... Upon Coun. RAY moving, seconded by Coun. CONNOLLY, that it be referred to legislative committee the motion was carried. On motion of Reeve Walters, seconded by Coun. RAY, Mr. Kean was heard regarding the proposed addition to his store in the Keenan block.

The general view of the council was

The general view of the council was against allowing the building to be erected in the manner proposed. Coun. Connolly proposed referring the matter to the fire and water committee, which was done.

From Mr. John Flurey, applying for a 21 years' lease of lots Nos. 15, 16, 17 and 18, on Queen's square, opposite Sylvester's foundry, for the purpose of erecting a grain elevator equal in all respects to the one at Mariposa station.... Mr. Flurey on motion was heard by the council, when he explained his application briefly, saying that a desire had been expressed for some time past for an elevator, for which there existed a pressing need, and he was willing to supply the want if fairly dealt with.—Referred to town property committee.

Mayor Walters said that the child left for him to provide for at last meeting had been placed with Mr. Beamish, who volunteered to care for same for 34 per month......His worship also said he would like the council to take steps to find out who held the town debentures, with a view to

outside of printing, instead of \$350, as stated in the letter. As for the statement that the council had been extravagant and had overrun the estimates for the year by \$5,000, he could say with certainty that the rate levied this year would provide for every cent of current town indebtedness. The \$200 fiag-nole statement, when analyzed, meant repairs to outside of town hall, meuding roof, the papering, repainting, etc., of the council chamber and police court room, and many other improvements.

meuding roof, the papering, repainting, etc., of the council chamber and police court room, and many other improvements. The allusion to the "dry well" was also ill-timed. It was a fact that an engine had pumped away for ten hours without lowering the water in the well perceptibly. The contract price of the d.g. cart was \$50 only—not \$100 as stated. Money had been expended by the council for an hospital that was certainly required, but the building was rented for \$6 per month, making it a fair investment. In conclusion Mayor Walters said he would not demur to the exhibition of the alleged curiosities at the coming fair provided the writer consented to occupy his proper position in the front ranks of the galaxy, and furnished as a realistic background to the scene highly illuminated views of the defunct skating rink, the brick factory, the planing mill, and other buildings all in flames. It was not befitting an honest man to make such false and baseless charges.

When Mayor Walters stopped speaking Mr. T. Fee rose and started to address the council but was at once called to order by the chairman. He persisted however in continuing, when Constable Clunan was instructed to see that order was preserved and Mr. Fee was induced to resume his seat.

DRAINAGE MATTERS.

Mr. H. O'Leary was heard regarding a drain running from Mr. McCarthy's hotel on Victoria avenue to the crossing on Kentst. The outlet there was not sufficiently large, and he asked the assistance of the council to extend the drain to Wellington

st....Coun. Connolly, chairman of streets and bridges, said the drain had not been pushed to the proper outlet.

Mr. E. Bannan put in a plea for something to be done to a drain crossing his property. It was necessary to obtain the approval of adjacent property holders, and the matter was accordingly left over. ASSESSMENT AND FINANCE.

Coun. RAY read report of finance and assessment committee, which stated that Mr. Cowan's appeal against a too high assessment had been considered and the committee could not recommend a reduction. The report also recommended payment of a number of accounts. ment of a number of accounts. REPORT OF FIRE AND WATER COMMITTEE

Reeve WALTERS, chairman, read a short report stating that at a meeting a resolu-tion had been passed authorizing the mayor to communicate with some expert mayor to communicate with some expert with regard to a system of waterworks for fire and domestic purposes, water to be supplied from flowing wells. The report also stated that the test well had been sounded by an engineer and was found to be 92 ft. 10 in. deep. It had been pumped for ten hours steadily, the pump raising 1,800 to 1,900 gallons per hour, and the water level had only been lowered some four feet, which filled up again rapidly. Coun. Connolly—Is that the dry well?—(laughter). In view of the delay that must (laughter). In view of the delay that must elapse before the new Worthington pump could be placed the rotary pumps had been put in order to guard somewhat against contingencies.—Report carried.

THE TOWN DEBENTURES. Moved by Coun. CONNOLLY, seconded by Coun. WINTERS, that the mayor be empowered to take what steps he may deem cessary to ascertain the holders of town

debentures. - Carried. PAYING FOR THE TEST WELL. Moved by Reeve Walters, seconded by Coun. Dr. McAlpine, that the treasurer be instructed to pay Mr. Mosely the balance of his account for sinking test well—\$112. Considerable discussion took place upon the above motion, some of the councillors contending that only 92 ft. 10 inches should be paid for. It was pointed out that Mr. Mosely had bored to a depth of 135 or 140 feet, at which depth he had lost his tools, and he was practically making a present to the town of 35 or 40 feet. At any rate the well had been sounded to a depth of over 92 feet, and the boring apparatus, occupying over 20 ft., was below this, so there could be no doubt of the low this, so there could be no doubt of the boring being over 100 ft. in depth. An amendment moved by Couns. RAY and BROWN with the object of having the account referred to the finance committee was lost. Coun. RAY demanded the yeas and nays for the original motion, which were taken as follows:— Yeas: Reeve Walters, Couns. Dr. McAlpine, Fisher, McGinley, Crandell; nays: Winters, Connolly, Brown, Ray.

A BATCH OF BY-LAWS.

The council next went into committee of The council next went into committee of the whole to rush through several by-laws. By-law No. 532, to authorize the mayor and treasurer to borrow the sum of \$8,000 to defrey current expenses; and by-law No. 533, to appoint a collector and fix salary. Mr. B. F. Jewett was again appointed, and on motion the salary was fixed at \$300, being a reduction of \$30 owing to consider able taxes having already been paid in. The by-laws were put through the usual The by-laws were put through the usual routine and were passed, signed and sealed.

PREPARING FOR SCOTT ACT REPEAL. Coun. CONNOLLY gave notice of motion of a by-law to regulate licenses for the coming year provided the Scott act be repealed.

The council then adjourned.
