Lake Scugog and the Lindsay Dam.

—Mr. Louis Coste, civil engineer of the public works department at Ottawa, accompanied by the reeve, J. W. Curts, and Couns. Willcox and Parks and Mr. Bigelow, companied by the reeve, J. W. Curts, and Couns. Willcox and Parks and Mr. Bigelow, left with the little steamer Mary Louise on Friday, 7th inst., for the purpose of examining the state of the navigation of the lake and river between Port Perry and Lindsay, with the view of applying some remedy for the keeping up of the waters of the lake to a proper and uniform level, to preserve navigation as well as for sanitary purposes and the preservation of the fishing interests. Mr. Coste is a gentleman who evidently understands his business, and is the first engineer the government has ever sent over this route to examine the grounds or cause of complaint which have been pressed on the attention of the government repeatedly for a number of years. He expressed himself as finding things in a much worse condition than he expected and thought that something should be done, as two-thirds of the distance between Port Perry and Lindsay the little steamer ploughed through mud and water or was jumping sunken logs, though the best channels and deepest water to be found was taken. Through this state of things being permitted the traffic on the lake, which Port Perry so largely prizes, has departed from her, and maiarial fevers, superinduced by reason of the constant and increasing encroachments of the millowners at Lindsay running off the water in the lake during the dry or summer season, with nine turbine water wheels operating the lake during the dry or summer season the lake during the dry or summer season, with nine turbine water wheels operating night ann day, which destroys navigation, and exposes a large amount of marsh land to breed the germs of disease and death. This drawing down of the water has been increased and persisted in for a number of years. The damage to this portion of the navigation of the inland waters has been a great loss to the steamboat owners and lumbermen, so much so that all the boats which have run on this lake in past years have been obliged to discontinue and conwhich have run on this lake in past years have been obliged to discontinue and confine their operations to the lakes north of Lindsay. The lake, instead of the clear, cool placid waters, with quiet ripple or heaving swell of former years, has become unfit for navigation, and is only a pond of mud, weeds and bogs, which make the continuance of such a state of things intolerable. This lake, situated in one of the best agricultural districts in Canada, should be maintained as a highway for traffic as well as a pleasure and delight to the tourist and those seeking relaxation and repose in camp life on its pleasant shores, whose amphitheatre of highlands, farms, gardens, orchards and shade receding back from the lake to the east, the west and the south, with its beautiful island and island homes, reflect like a panorama in its mirrored waters. In childhood we have stood upon its banks and looked down through its glassy waters and have seen a heaven below and then

looked up and beheld a heaven above, reflecting like two mirrors, each in the other, its moon and twinkling stars. Why should all this be destroyed? We ask again, why? The government have the power and should exercise it in this matter of so much vital importance to a large section of country.—Standard.
