The Base Ball Match at Victoria Rosi-Salem v. Fencion Falls.

[To the Editor of THE POST.] SIR,-In your last issue a communication from "Salemite" was brought before my notice, and with your permission I would like to correct some of his state ments. In tacir fifth innings the base runner ran over first base, turned to the left and was touched with the ball before returning to the base. He was therefore out, as he was all the time on "fair ground."—Vide rule 53.

cause he was unable to determine whether the runner turned on foul or fair ground but because he did not know whether it made any difference which way the runner
