OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POSE, LINDSAY, Oct. 4, 1888.

Another marked advance has taken place in wheat and barley is getting into mitisfactory figures. Considerable deliveries have been made at the Lindsay market which in barley is within one or two cents of the Toronto price, and from five to seven cents ahead of other markets of the district. In wheat and other grain Lindsay is the best market, and a lively business may be expected from this time. A Berlin cable says: "The failure of the har-

vest in Germany is attracting serious atte There is a poor crop of both cereals and pota-toes, and the price of bread is rapidly rising. Since 1887 rye has advanced 48 marks and wheat 31 marks. In some districts the bakers have raised the price of bread 19 pfennings per b. Herr Richter, in an article in the Liberal Zeitung, calculates that Germany will require 13,000,000 hectolities of American wheat to meet the deficiency. He says Germany must hereafter demand a diminution of the duty on cereal imports. The Progressists intend to actively agritate the question."

About 300 bushels of wheat offered and sold at \$1.09 to \$1.10 for fall, \$1.07 for spring, and 80c to 90jc for goose. Barley active, with sales of 12,000 bushels at 65c to 79ic. 


