> THE GALT MYSTERY DETECTIVE MURRAY MAKES AN ARREST AT THOROLD.

Hannah Boyd, a Pretty Domestic Taken into Custody-She is Charged with Sending Poisoned Candy-Arraigned and Remanded-Full Description of

THOROLD, Oct. 20.-Detective Murray of Toronto arrested Miss Hannah Bond here vesterday in connection with the Galt poisoning case, and took her to Berlin last evening. The arrest was made very quietly and the prisoner was taken away on the next train. She had been living as a servant in a highly respectable family here for the past three months. It is reported that she formerly lived with the Lowell family in Galt. When arrested Miss Bond was very indignant, and denied all knowledge of the affair. During the short time she has been in Thorold a favorable opinion has been formed of her by the family with whom she associated herself. She is a very good-looking brunette, and has anything but the appearance of a domestic. Her features indicate a fairly refined intellectual nature. She has a good presence and a very handeome figure. She is about twentytwo years of age, and in height five feet four inches. Miss Bond has deep brown eyes, dark hair and a fair complexion.
Although she possesses all the attractions which would enable her to command the attentions of the maie sex, she has rigidly declined to keep company with any gentle-

BEFORE THE J. P. BERLIN, Oct. 21 .- At a late hour last night Government Detective Murray arrived here from Thorold with a young woman whom he had arrested in connection with the Galt poisoning case. She was brought before Mr. D. Speers, J.P., under the name of Hannah Boyd, alias Anna the name of Hannah Boyd, alias Anna Bond, and charged under a warrant obtained in Galt with feloniously sending poisoned candies to Mrs. Cherry, Miss Lowell, and Miss Ridley. The prisoner's right name is Boyd. She assumed the name of Bond on removing from Galt to Thorold some months ago. She appeared to take the matter pretty coolly. Without offering evidence or asking the prisoner to plead to the charge the detective applied for a remand. The court adjourned the case for eight days, and in the meantime Hannah Boyd will remain here in gaol. Detective Murray, leaving the prisoner here, went on to Toronto.

GALT, Oct. 21.-A genuine sensation wac caused here to-day when it was whispered around that Detective Murray had arrested Hannah Boyd in Thorold for being implicated in the wholesale attempt at poisoning. Detective Murray has been working very quietly since his arrival here. He has held long conferences with all the parties and with Coroner Varden. REPORT OF FIRE AND WATER COMMITTEE.

Mayor WALTERS read the following report of the fire and water committee, relative to putting in a system of water-works in town:

In compliance with instructions given at meeting of council, held on 17th of September last, authorizing me to take the necessary steps for procuring the services of a practical hydraulic engineer to advise the council as to the best possible scheme of procuring and supplying the town with water for fire and domestic purposes, I beg to report that I have advertised in the three leading papers in Toronto and Scientific American. In reply I have received eight applications for the position. One of the applicants came here personally, Mr. L. M. Bowman, and was very much impressed with the advantages of the town for securing a sufficient supply of water. ... His worship also submitted all letters received by him referring to this matter.

Coun. Ray asked what the cost of the proposed work would be, and where the necessary funds were to be collared.

Mayor Walters replied that the cost of the step would not be much; as the town had gone to the expense of sinking the test well it would not be wise to let the matter drop.

Coun. CRANDELL's amendment in favor of the repeal was finally carried on the following divi-sion:—Yeas: Crandell, McGinley, Connolly, Fish-er, Brown and McAlpine. Nays: Ray, Winters, Williams and Walters.

ANOTHER FINANCE REPORT. Coun. RAY read the ordinary finance report, which recommended payment of a number of small accounts and was adopted. REPORT OF TOWN PROPERTY COMMITTEE.

In the absence of the chairman. Dep.-reeve Bryans, Coun. Fisher read the report of the committee, which recommended accepting Mr. E. Fee's offer of \$500 for lot No. 7, Queen's square, providing certain conditions be carried out. Mr. Fleury's application for a lease of lots 15, 16 and 17, for the erection of a grain elevator, was not favorably dealt with.

Coun. Ray said that he regretted that Mr. Flurey's offer was not favorably considered; he would like to see such enterprise encouraged.


