Business and Produce.

Local deliveries in barley and wheat continue very small. Farmers are holding back for higher prices, while they push on with their fall plowing. As a consequence accounts remain unpaid and the effect on general business in depressing. Three general business in depressing. Three weeks or a month will probably bring large sales and lots of money.

The Barley Question.

We take the following interesting review from The Empire of Oct. 23rd: In our commercial columns of 12th inst... in an article headed as above, after a care. suggestions were pressed upon the consideration of the farmers of this province, as to the expediency of selling at once, at least a part of their barley crop, at the very satisfactory prices which were then offering at all of our principal markets. During the last ten days farmers have been selling much more freely in many sections, but from other places it is reported that they are still holding back under the expectation of higher prices. The total quantity sold throughout the province forms a much smaller proportion of the farmers of this province, as is likely to be taken at fair prices. Just now prices here are only 3c. to 4c. above what they were at the corresponding period of last year, and a little later on in November last year No. 1 sold at 80c. to 81c., and No. 2 at 75c. to 77c. It must not be forgotten that the greater proportion of the mean building. Another thing must be remembered, this weather is unfavorable for the maltster, and a lever to depress prices. Barley is the most sensitive of grains as to prices, and it takes but little pressure to put it either up or down. This is to be regretted, as all the late intelligence with regard to the movement and feeling at the large receiving points appears to indicate the probability of a decline rather than any advance in prices.

The receipts of barley in Chicago and billwaukee during the last ten days have been enormous for in excess of the countries. een enormous, far in excess of the quanity ever before received at these points in the same number of days in any pre-vious year. The large early deficiency in receipts at all the western lake and river ports is being rapidly filled up, and without pretending to offer any opinion as to whether the recent scale of receipts can be maintained or not, the present and actual fact of these immense r ceipts demands

fact of these immense r ceipts demands careful consideration and reflection.

We subjoin some extracts from a letter from a leading barley firm in Chicago, and dated 18th inst: "Our barley market continues very strong for sound malting barley, such as is suitable for brewing purposes, while low grade, thin, damaged samples seem to become weaker from day to day. During the past couple of days there have been quite liberal sales of California and Washington Territory barley at prices ranging from 75 to 78c per bushel. We understand that there is to be considerable to be marketed of this class of barley, and are of the opinion that this will have the effect of preventing an advance over present quotations for our wance over present quotations for our Western grain. It seems to us that the better grades of bank; have advanced about as high as they will go, since we have no doubt our consumers will take the Washington Territory and California bailey at present prices in preference to paying anything above for the North-west-

"We note during the past few days that the quality of the arrivals upon our market shows some improvement; we find that there are more samples offering; we refer to plump, fairly sound barley, though

dark in color.

"With the New York State crop as reported by you and others, and the large amount of Washington Territory and California barley coupled with the fact that the malting trade is exceedingly dull at present, we think that at best to-day's quotations for the better grades will be about the top of the market for some time to come at least.

It does not often happen that the probable tendency of the grain market is so well defined as to warrant a large receiver in expressing such decided opinions as are given above. The considerable deliveries of California and Washington Territory barley were hardly expected by the trade, and so long as these can be bought at 75 to 7dc, it is useless to look for any extensive sale of Canadian at prices to cover present. asle of Canadian at prices to cover present cost in Canada, freight and du y. A late Buffalo letter says: "We have been buying no more than our trade and requirements made it necessary to buy. We know that a great deal of western, as low know that a great deal of western, as low as No 3, nas found its way East, and is turning out well, beyond expectation. We have seen samples of malt made from it, and were really surprised at its result. Canada and New York State wil have to come down, as brewers and maitsters will not pay such wide difference in prices, and will use the western until they can buy the other at reasonable prices.

Although the receipts of Canada barley in Oswego this season to date have been largely below the usual quantity, they have not the season to date have been largely below the usual quantity, they

week.

New York maltsters say that they would prefer working on Canada barley, but they dare not undertake to do so at present prices, as they cannot possibly find customers for malt from Canada barley at prices so very far above those at which western malt can be sold.

Our farmers are again reminded that for almost all sections of the province, the lake and canal route is the cheapest by which their barley can reach the large proportion of American maltsters; 20th November is the latest date at which canal shipments can be made with safety from Oswego to New York, so that there are only a few weeks of this route in which to move their crop; winter trade by rail, to move their crop; winter trade by rail, when there are large stocks remaining in Canada at close of navigation is generally slow and very fluctuating. The prospects of any advance in prices are by no means encouraging and at best very un-certain; the economy in transportation is considerable and can be secured by prompt selling; we consider that the propriety of holding for a rise is very questionable, and hope that farmers generally will

conclude to sell at current prices. The Globe of Wednesday says: "Within the past fortnight strenuous efforts have been made to depress the barley market. It has been done chiefly in the interests of the United States malsters, and the chief sufferers are Untario farmers. Very misleading statements as to the situation have been made, and the arguments are so one-sided that it does not require a person of any superior intellect to discover the real object of this bear movement." The Globe charges that the columns of the Empire have been used for the purpose of furthering this dastardly onslaught on the Canadian farmer for the benefit of the United States malster. The Globe quotes a number of malster. The Globe quotes a number of extracts from the foregoing article in the Emrire and proceeds to say: The heavy receipts at a few points west will not materially change the situation. At western lake ports the receipts from September 1st to October 13th were only 4,137,311 bushels, as against 5,427,986 bushels the corresponding period of last year, a decrease of 1,290,675 bushels. 
