LINDSAY TOWN COUNCIL.

The Proposed Waterworks' System Dis. The Dog By-law Still "on Deck"—Reports of Committees — Communica-

A special meeting of the town fathers called chiefly to consider certain matters relating to the proposed waterworks system, was held Monday evening at 8 o'clock in the council chamber. Present: Reeve Walters, Dep-reeve Williams, and Couns. Ray, Dr. McAlpine, Brown, Fisher, Con-nolly and Crandell. In the absence of Mayor Walters, who arrived later on the evening train, Reeve Walters took the chair. A letter was read from Mr. Wassels, the engineer, who had visited the town at the request of the fire and water committee, stating that after two or three days explorations in town he felt confident that an abundant supply of water could be obtained by going some 20 feet lower or say 40 or 50 feet above the water level; perhaps the level of Fenelon river might be reached. In case his services were retained as engineer his remuneration would be one per cent, of the total cost of the

tained as engineer his remuneration would be one per cent. of the total cost of the system for drawing the plans and specifications if scheme did not carry, or three per cent. of whole for superintendance and other services, plans and specifications, etc., in case work went on.

Reeve Walters explained that some \$500 had been voted for the sinking of test wells, and out of this amount Mr. Mosely had been paid in all \$212.50, leaving at least \$250 still in the hands of the fire and water committee.

water committee.

Some discussion took place as to the probable system that the engineer would recommend—whether a high reservoir or a low one would be selected. The high reservoir would require to be of sufficient elevation to force the water to all parts of the town. The low reservoir would involve the use of hand or steam encions.

Coun. McALPINE took the view that the

Coun. McAlping took the view that the stand-pipe or high reservoir was the proper system. It was more costly in the first place, but it would cut off a lot of expense for caretakers, engines, etc., and was the system favored by large cities. A system of waterworks would be an absolute necessity for the town in a few years, and a system of drainage as well, but it would be useless to meddle with the latter until the town had pure water, although there could be no doubt that the town was yearly becoming contaminated by the quantity of sewerage thrown out.

Coun. Ray explained lucidly the details of Mr. Wassel's meeting with the fire and water committee. He believes the engineer's offer as to plans and specifications was very reasonable and should be closed with so as to have something tangible to present to the electors. If the system was voted down much valuable information at least would be obtained and the plans would be available in the future.

Coun. Connolly advised calling a meeting of the ratepayers, when a statement of the steps taken already and the probable cost of the system could be put before the citizens; if a favorable opinion was expressed then the plans could be obtained.

Coun. Crandell entered upon a short review of the cost and faults of the present system, and felt strongly the need for something better. He considered Mr. Wassel's offer a very fair one and favored procuring the plans at once; then there would be material for a public meeting to work upon. Possibly there might be a suggestion to the effect that a company would be willing to undertake the work.

Reeve Walters favored obtaining the plans and specifications at once.
