To manufacture this quantity a deal of grain will be required, and the farmers will have a good market ethelic dors.

The only drawback to more rapid work is the fact that all the stuff taken out has to be towed to the one dumping ground—near the northern meuth of the old river—which necessitates an increasing delay for scows according as the dredge works south. —The McGibeny palace car to arrive Thursday, Nov. Sth, will no doubt prove a great attraction to the curious. It is the largest and bast equipped palace car in use, being 71 feet in length, nearly twice as long as an ordinary car. In the front is located the kitchen, furnished with range, water heaters, etc.; back of this is the pantry; then comes the drawing-room, with magnificent piano and other articles of luxury; then follows library, sitting room and bathroom. In addition to these are fixteen berths and two fine staterooms. Under the car are lockers for holding provisions, coal, ice and such bulky goods. The coach cest \$20,000.

—Mr. Norman Barnhart, superintendent of M. M. Boyd & Co.'s large lumbering interests, passed through town Monday evening on his way to Ottawa for men. His firm does not expect to put in more than four shanties this winter, besides the "jobbers," who will number eight or nine. Altogether about 350 men will be employed. Last season a thousand men were in camp for the firm at one time, but it was a forced cut to a considerable extent, as the limits had been over run with fire and the timber had to be saved from the attacks of the "borers." As compared with ordinary years the coming season's operations will be fully up to the average. Wages average from \$15 to \$18 per month.
