Telephone Extensions

With the exception of a new line between Toronto, Hamilton and London, to be worked on the long-distance system, the Bell Telephone Company has nearly completed an unusually heavy season's work in the way of extensions to the system, and the officers report having used this year, in the Ontario Department alone, over 13,000 poles, and 1.500 miles of wire, most of which is copper. The principal new lines built were from Toronto to Arthur via Urangeville; Orillis to Waubaushene, and Barrie to Midland and Penetanguishene; Owen Sound to Hanover; Wirgham to Kincardiae; Teeswater to London via Wingham, Clinton and Lucan, with branch to Parkhill; and in the province of Quebec, Montreal to Three Rivers. Additional wires have also been put up between Toronto and Oshawa; Berlin and Stratford; and Listowel and Harriston; and the following new exchanges and agencies epened, viz: In Ontario: Alisa Craig, Bolton, Caledon, Chesley, Caldwater, Elmvale, Elmwood, Exeter, Fesserton, Grand Valley, Lucan, Lucknow, Parkhill, Phelpston, Tara, Teeswater, Tottenham and Woodbridge; and in Quebec: Bedford, Berthier, Charlemagne, Dorval, Joliette, Knowlton, L'Assomption, Louisville, Stanbridge East, Stanbope and Valois. Wheat at \$1.20, a price no one last year expected to see again, has resulted in large ocal deliveries, checked to some extent by the very bad reads. Mud rules everywhere. Farmers are still holding back beriey, and as there is a very large quantity for local delivery, the failure to sell and put the money in circulation has a paralyzing effect on business, and especially on the finances. Another week or two will probably see large local sales of barley. An improvement in the market is expected after the presidental election next Tuesday.

Peterboro and Victoria Cheese Board, Twenty factories boarded 2,645 boxes at the theese board at Peterboro Tuesday. These were cheese board at Peterboro Tuesday. These were all October make. The buyers present were Messrs. Wrighton, Cook, Bird, Bower and Fitzgerald There were no sales made, the highest bid was 9½c, offered by Mr. Cook. The bidding was slow, only four being boarded. Mr. Cook advised the factories to accept the offer of 9½c, for they might do worse if they waited. He had been told by Inspector Whitton that October cheese in the Belleville section had been mucky and he would rather have August cheese, as the October make was not liable to carry over as the weather had been cold and the milk too sweet. Mr. Bower said he had bought cheese near Belleville since the board meeting for less than was offered then. The cheese boarded was as follows:


