Lindsay Board of Education. A regular meeting of the school board took place on Tuesday evening. Present-Messrs. Winters, McMurtry, Reeves, Dean, Flavelle, Kennedy, Stewart, McNeillie and Smyth. In the absence of Mr. Hudspeth, Mr. Stewart was appointed chairman. The clerk read the minutes of last meeting which were approved. Mr. Harstone, head-master of the high school, read his report, giving the attendance for the month of September, 149. Average attendance, 129. The report also stated that Mr. McPherson resigned his position as English teacher. His report for October gave an attendance of 156; average, 129. The secretary read the report of Mr. Broderick, head-master of the public schools. The report gave the total attendance as 730; average attendance, 604. The resignations of Mr. McPherson and Miss Hicks were received. The secretary read a letter from S. Cornell, relative to improving the tower of the collegiate institute; also a communication from John F. Farewell, relative to the annual meeting of the high and public school trustees to be held in Toronto on the 13th November. A report was received from Mr. Broderick, head-master of the public schools, with reference to the punishment of youth named Hearn by one of the teachers, approving of the teacher's course. appointed chairman. The clerk read the minteachers, approving of the teacher's course. The secretary read a communication from Mr. A. H. Grant, asking for a room in the new colfor the pupils of the schools. On motion of Mr. McMurtry, seconded by Mr. Flavelle, the secretary was authorised to advertise in the Mail, Globe and Empire for a science master, salary \$1,000; a specialist in modern languages, salary \$1,000, and a commercial master, salary \$900, duties to commence on 1st January. On motion of Mr. McNeillie, seconded by Mr. Flavelle, the appointment of Mr. C. H. Wright, as science master for the balance of the year at a salary of \$150 was approved. On motion of Mr. McNeillie, seconded by Mr. McMurtry, the report of the head-master of the public schools, in reference to the complaint against Miss McQueen, was approved. The report referred to the punish of young Hearn, and the tescher's course was sustained. The board then adjourned.

Lindsay Town Council.

Regular meeting of council was held Monday evening in the council chamber. Business was taken up at 8 o'clock, with Mayor Walters in the chair, Reeve Walters and Couns. McAlpine, Ray, Crandell, Brown, Fisher, Winters and McGinley present. Communications were read by the clerk from Mr. H. McMahon of the east ward, claiming damages for injuries sustained through a defective sidewalk about three weeks ago; from officers of Lindsay central exhibition, stating that owing to bad weather the receipts at the late fair were over \$300 less than the previous year, obliging them to ask council for the \$200 guarantee fund provided, for the first time; from Mr. Robt. McLean, secretary of the underwriter's association, Toronto, stating that he would not like to express an opinion re McIlvanie's gas making machine without first referring question to the association... Coun. Crandell introduced the subject of Mr. J. Carter's assessment upon the stock purchased by him from Wm. Cowan, who was the party assessed, claiming that the valuation was excessive and altogether out of proportion to that of other merchants. In proof of this he read the assessments of eight of the leading dry goods men. A petition was also handed in signed by a number of Kent-st merchants, who favor the proposed reduction of assessment. Coun. McAlpine supported Coua. Crandell's contention, and said that if the council did not do justice Mr. Carter would take the matter into court. The matter was discussed at considerable length and with no little warmth of expression.
