Greey, the manufacturers at Toronto. He pronounced everything in proper shape and grinding was commenced, and flour is now being made which we are certain will soon win a name for itself. The work of putting in the machinery, which is very intricate, was done by and under the superintendence of Mr. W. B. Feir, and reflects great credit on his mechanical skill. Mr. F. possesses the two needed requisites for the business, namely, a good knowledge of milling and mill-wright work. Mr. Feir is to manage the flouring, and this is of itself a sufficient guarantee that the quality will be of a high grade. The oatmest mill is also running and we expect ere long do as large a trade as ever.

DEATH OF A PROMINENT CITIZEN.—Mr. Neil C. Love, J. P., the well-known druggist, died at half-past three o'clock Friday afternoon, after a few hours illness, from apoplexy, at his residence, Gerrard-st. east, surrounded by his sorrowing family. The sudden death of Mr. Love closes the last chapter in a busy and honorable career. The deceased was born in Saltcoats, Scotland, in the parish of Ardrossan, Scotland, in 1819. He came to this country in 1837, and settled for a short time in Toronto with his brother, who carried on a drug business on King st. west. NEEDLER'S GRIST MILL.—The refitting of the grist mill is now nearing completion, and in the course of a few days will of the grist mill is now nearing completion, and in the course of a few days will commence work. The contract was taken by Messrs. W. & J. G. Greey of Toronto, and the work was performed under the superintendance of Mr. Chas. Keown. It is now a full roller mill, having ten set of rolls on the gradual reduction process, and has a capacity of 75 barrels a day It would be difficult to place any more machinery in the building than it now contains, being scarcely room for a rat trap, and the way the grain is carried from floor to floor is surpriving. In the basement with the water wheels and driving shafts is the cleaning machinery for sifting, brushing and polishing the grain before it is sent to the rolls. On the first floor are the five double sets of improved rolls, with the packers and other appliance. The second floor holds two large purifiers for purification of the middings, and a feeder and a mixer for feeding the products to the different breaks. On the top floor is placed seven flour dressers, five scalping reels and a bran duster. In the first four rolls the grain is reduced to bran, and in the other six rolls the germ and middlings are still further reduced. The roller process is considered a great improvement on the stones, enabling a larger percentage of flour to be made from the grain, and if necessary a division of the starch and gluten. Many of the farmers of the district have for some time wished to have the roller process, and it is to be hoped Mr. Needler will obtain the business which his expenditure demands. his expenditure demands.


