Regular Meeting—The Cowan Assessment -Committee Reports-Town Selicitor Appointed—The Dog By-law.

The town fathers met on Monday evening at 7.45 sharp, in the council chamber. Present: Reeve Walters, Dep. reeve Williams, and Couns. Dr. McAlpine, Ray, Brown, Fisher, McGinley, Connolly, Winters, Crandell and Ross.

In the absence of Mayor Walters, Reeve H. Walters took the chair.

COMMUNICATIONS. following communications were read by the clerk protem, Mr. F. Knowl-

From Mr. H. O'Leary, on behalf of Mr.

R. Murphy, requesting the council to state the quantity of land they intended to purchase in the vicinity of the test well, and asking for an immediate answer.—Referred to fire and water committee to say, try Spratt & Killen.—03-tf.

From G. H. Hopkins, barrister, applying for the position of town solicitor now vacant.—Laid on table.

THE COWAN ASSESSMENT. From G. H. Hopkins, barrister, stating that the petition of F. C. Taylor and others asking that W. Cowan's assessment be reduced had been considered with reference to any liability the council might incur in granting the same, stating that in his opinion the council could not be the time to buy.—17-tf. made liable for an abatement as asked unless it could be shown that some pecuniary advantage to the members accrued erefrom Coun. CRANDELL here explained at some length his idea of the case n question, and strongly advised reducing the sum asked..... Coun. RAY took exception to some of Coun. CRANDELL's arguments. Mr. Cowan, he said, was trustee for an estate; some of the interested parties resided in Toronto; that the estate was not yet wound up; and the contention that because Mr. Cowan, who was liable for the tax, resided below Montreal and in another province, it would be difficult to compel him to do anything in the matter, and hence that it would be hetter to take what was offered than hold out for the whole, was not in the proper spirit and whole, was not in the proper spirit and would be a bad precedent. The council did not want a cent that was not justly due them, nor should it sacrifice a cent for fear of incurring costs. The first proposition made was that the stock should be assessed for \$10,000; next that \$2,600 would be the proper figure; and the last was to the officer that \$5.001 would satisfy overwer. the effect that \$5,000 would satisfy every body; which would be right for the council to select...Coun. McALPINE strongly advocated the reduction asked for. He knew for a fact that strangers were imposed upon by the assessor. He knew a score of instances of the kind. The assessment law needed readjustment—poor people were paying twice as much in proportion as merchants and others.

Coun CONNOLLY moved, seconded by Coun. Ross, that the opinion of Mr. Hopkins be referred to the finance and assessment committee.

In amendment, moved by Coun. Mc-ALPINE, seconded by Coun. CRANDELL, that communication from Mr. Hopkins be laid on table.—Lost and original motion declared carried declared carried.

FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT.

A long report was read from Mr. H. Hughes, fire warden, which gave the names of those summoned for infractions of the fire by law provisions, and stating that some had been fined according to the provisions of the by-law and had afterwards gone on and finished work contrary to law. THE DOG BY-LAW AGAIN.

Couns.CRANDELL and Ross supported a strong resolution to the effect that doubt existed as to the legality of the town dog-by-law; that it had been found impossible to enforce it, asking that it be repealed and authorizing the clerk to prepare a ballot to be cast at the coming municipal elections in order to ascertain public feeling regarding the matter, the chief constable in the meantime to suppend action in this direction.

Coun. CRANDELL defended the motion in a speech of considerable duration, holding that the by-law as at present drafted would not hold water and that the peoshould be taken into the confidence of the council and asked whether they wanted a dog by-law or not. If they did not they would have to pay the money in some other way.....Some further discussion took place which was finally closed by the following amendment:

Moved by Coun. Ray, seconded by Coun. Brown, that inasmuch as said by-law had been referred to legislative committee for consideration, and as said committee has not yet reported, the council does not think proper to interfere in the matter.
