This case was tried at the assizes at Lindsay last spring before Justice Falconbridge and judgment given for the plaintiff. The defendant, however, appealed to the full court and the appeal was argued on the 21st inst., when the judgment given at the trial was reversed and appeal was argued on the Zist inst., when the judgment given at the trial was reversed and judgment directed to be entered for the defendant, with costs of action. Mitchell is owner of lot 13 and Arnott of the n. w. qr. of 14 in the 11th con. of Manvers. The line between their lands ran wholly through the woodland; and although it had been run many years ago no line fence had ever been built upon it, but an old fence along Arnott's clearing about four or six rods west of the line and an irregular slash fence approximating to the line had answered for purposes of protection to the clearances. When Arnott went to clear this strip of land between the old fence and the line Mitchell brought the present action of trespass against him claiming that he had gained a title by possession to this strip of land on the grounds of the existence of the fence, and that his cattle had pastured ever this land in common with the woodland on his own lot. Justice Falconbridge considered the plaintiff had gained a title by virtue of the statute of limitations, but the full court reversed this, holding that as the fenc. had been built by the defendant's predecessor in title it was no act or inclosure on the part of the plaintiff, and that the fact of the plaintiff's cattle running over this land at intervals of their own accord was no such possession as would cause the statute of imitations to run in the plaintiff's favor. Hypnotic Entertainments. Prof. Reynolds, the celebrated mesmerist pened a week's engagement in Bradburn's pera house last Monday evening, and was welcomed by a full house. COMMERCIAL NEWS.

OFFICE OF THE CANADIAN POST, LINDSAY, Nov. 29, 1888.

The weak and downward tendency of the wheat and barley market has stimulated deliveries, and the local markets have been fairly brisk. Farmers are selling wheat readily at \$1.00 when they would not look at \$1.25 a few weeks ago; and many who refused 75c. and 78c. for barley are now glad to get 60c. Such are the ape and downs of the grain market.

The Baltimore Produce Report presents the following statement in support of the assump tion that wheat prices are too high: "We are going behind in our exports at the rate of 4,500,000 bushels of wheat and flour per month. Assuming that this rate of decrease should be
maintained during the remainder of the crop
year the total decrease would amount to 54,000,000 bushels. The production of wheat this year
is generally conceded to have been in the neighborhood of 405,000,000 bushels. If the 54,000,000
bushels decrease in export be added to the year's
production it would seem that we are quite as
well off this crop year as we were last year,
when 457,000,000 bushels was produced. Yet
the price of May wheat in Chicago is \$1.09, compared with 81c last year. The price of wheat,
therefore, is too high, with the supply, at present at least, as large as last year. Whether or
not exports will revive later on is a problem,
but it is undoubtedly true that in such a revival
lies the only hope of further permanent advance."

The reports from foreign markets show that they are getting a sufficient amount of wheat from countries other than the Atlantic seaboard, and notwithstanding large imports into the United Kingdom, the amount on passage has steadily increased, now amounting to the largest quantity of the season. The imports and farmers' deliveries in the United Kingdom last week were slightly below consumption for the first time in over two months. On Monday two cargoes were taken for Liebon on a basis of 109½ to 109½ f. o. b. from stores, the freight paid being 6e per quarter This order had been in the market for some time, and was reached by the decline.

Sheep in limited supply and prices unchanged; the best quoted at 3½c to 3½c per lb; a few good butchers' sold at \$5 to \$5.25 a head; inferior to medium at \$3;25 to \$4, and rams 3c to 3½c per lb. Lambs in fair demand and firm, choice bringing \$4 to \$4.50, and inferior to medium at \$25 to \$5.50. Calves dull and steady. Choice beasts, of 200 to 300 lbs sold at \$19 to \$14 a head, or from 7c to 3c dressed weight; medium calves, or those weighing 125 to 135 lbs sell at \$6 to \$7 a head, or 6c to 7c dressed weight; rungh calves, \$3 to 35. Hous are steady; choice light fat sold at 5½c to 5½c, store hogs at ½t to 4½c, and stags at 3c to 3½c.—[Globe of Wednesday. Toronto Live Stock Markets.






