

A distressing railway accident at Orillia last Monday night cut short a most promising career. Mr. A. D. Kean, a rising young lawyer of fine talents, met with an accident that terminated fatally in a few hours. It appears that the deceased was on his way home from Toronto in C. P. R. express and must have been sleeping for he did not leave the car when the train stopped, but as it was moving off again. He then hastily made his way out, and in getting off the moving train in some way slipped and fell under the wheels, three of which passed over both legs. The train was stopped, and the unfortunate young man received every possible attention. Four of the local ductors were summoned and amputation of both legs took place. The loss of blood was so great and the shock to the system so severe that Kean never rallied. He died early Wednesday morning. He was a son of Mr. A. F. Kean, a leading merchant of Orillia, and was only 25 or 30 years of age. He was a prominent member of the legal profession with with a more than local reputation. He was a brother of Mr. M. D. Obituary-Mrs. Margaret P. Williams Mrs. Margaret P. Williams, who died at Inof Rev. Dr. Williams of this town, was a woman who deserved more than a passing notice. She belonged to a family that was eminently Methodist. Her grandfather was a member of the first society organized by John Weeley in Camelford, Cornwall. Her father, Robert Pearse, was a local preacher from the age of seventeen years till he closed his work fift; years afterwards. Her uncle, Rev. William Burkess, was a leading Weeleyen minister, and his poetry was as widely read as were his sermons. Her sons are found in the same work, one of them, the late Rev. John B Williams, gave great promise of usefulness, but was cut off in early life; another the Rev. Dr. Williams of Cambridge-st. Methodist church. Lindsay, is well-known to our readers and known throughout the province as an able and eloquent minister; one son-in-law, Rev. A. M. Deling, is a Methodist minister stationed at Wolford, Ont. The celebrated Rev. Mark Guy Pearse is her nephew; and among her nieces one is inarried to the Rev. Ma. Pratt; and another to he Rev Henry Burton, whose "Wayside Songe," so tender and touching, are well known in many a Wesleyan home in the eld land. Another nephew is the Rev. George Williams, Congregational minister of Leeds, Eng. Mrs. Williams came to this country with her husband and little family in 1842. Mr. Williams was well known as a local preacher and clease leader, and was profoundly respected. He died in 1852, in his allst year.
