They then formed in rank and marched to the McArthur house, where the two elevens and a few others partook of what was called an oyster surper, but which embraced turkeys, geese, ducks and all the available delicacies. The Lindsayites left for home about 7 o'clock, escorted by the band, but feativities were kept up for several hours after their departure.


