judgment in the case of the Attorney-General v. Francis, in which the issue concerning certain timber limits on White Fish lake affected both the Dominion and Provincial governments The case was one of great interest, involving The case was one of great interest, involving, in addition to the dispute as to the boundaries of the reserve, the question whether the Onla is or the Dominion government had the right to issue licenses, enter upon and to cut imber.
