The Witness correspondent says: The customs system, as administered in this country, has long been a public scandal and disgrace. The daily press has denouncunit against it in stern conde unit against it in stern condemnation.

After three years of constant stirring up the question is at last to be ventilated in full and in the proper place in the house where the minister of customs sits as the official head of the customs department. The opposition have determined to arraign the administration of the customs system in its various ramifications and call the government to account. The discussion will ensue on Mr. Holton's motion, of which notice has already been given.

Last Thursday evening was taken up with a discussion of the prohibition question. It will be remembered that when this matter was up the week before it was left in this shape:-Mr. Jamieson had moved a straight prohibition resolution, Mr. Wood (Brockville) an amendment favoring prohibition when public sentiment is rife for it, and Mr. Taylor of Leeds. an amendment to the amendment favoring the enactment of prohibition, with compensation to manufacturers on a piebiscite being taken with a favorable result.
