KILLED ON THE TRACK.—Friday's Globe contains the following item: "A shocking and fatal accident occurred last night on the Grand Trunk line near the eastern limit of the city. The No. 3 Montreal express, which leaves the union station at nine o'clock in the evening, is always followed by a pilot engine as far as Scarboro heights. Last night on the outward trip the driver of the pilot engine, C. Blylock, saw what he thought was the form of a dead man at the side of the track. Upon his return careful search was made, and the body of a man frightfully mangled was discovered about two hundred yards from the city limit, within the city. The engine at once returned to York station, where a flat car was obtained and on it the corpse at once returned to York station, where a flat car was obtained and on it the corpse was brought to Don station, thence to the morgue by the police wagon from station No. 4. The body was frightfully mangled. The right foot was cut off and the left very much disfigured. The head and neck was also much cut and bruised. The poor fellow was apparently about thirty-six years of age with light moustache and side whiskers. All the belongings of the dead man showed him a person in at least somfortable circumstances. Near the body was found a galvanized cash box centaining \$2.36. The only means by which he could be identified was by an evangelist's hymn book, printed at the tract repository, Belfast, Ireland, on the fly leaf of which his name, Daniel McBryan, Woodville, Ont., was written in red ink." In Favor of Reciprocity.

The Irish Canadian, aconservative paper has come out in support of the reform policy of unrestricted reciprocity. In its last issue it says : "Unrestricted reciprocity with the United States would not alone give the Canadian agriculturist a better market, in many cases, to sell in, but also a better market, in many cases to buy in; and with the passing of such a measure, there is not the slightest doubt that the value of every farm in Ontario would jump up at least 20 per cent. in selling value-for farms, like everything else, fluctuate in value according as they are profitable or otherwise. Sir John Macdonald and his government are well known to be bitterly opposed to reciprocity; and it is no secret that the American government and people will give us no reciprocity while Sir John remains in power. Therefore every farmer who wants to put money in his pocket, and manufacturer and merchant who would see the farmer pros-perous enough to buy goods and pay for them, must vote the conservatives out and the reformers in—the reformers, as is well known, being favorable to the policy of friendly relations with the United States, and freedom to the farmer to sell his pro-duce in the most profitable market."
