LINDSAY, FRIDAY, MARCH 29, 1889. A TERRIBLE CRIME.

A Triple Murder at Guelph-The Murderer captured in Toronto.

The fair city of Guelph was thrown ferment of excitement on morning last and everywhere there was but one topic of conversation-the terrible tragedy by which a wife and her two daughters were murdered by a fond husband and father. The whole affair is one of the saddest that has ever occurred in Canada. A sensitive man is accused of embezzling a few hundred dollars. Unable to endure that his family should know the dishonor and poverty attendant on what he protested was a mistake, but for which he must suffer, he deliberately gathered his family together Tuesday morning and shot them one after the other. This is the only reason his friends and acquaintances can assign for the murder. Wm. H. Harvey, the man whose bloody work has desolated his family, was a book-keeper for Mr. J. W. Lyon and the World Publishing Company. He came to Guelph with his family about eighteen months ago from Toronto. He soon became a respected citizen, and, connecting himself with St. George's church, won general esteem and confidence. What, therefore, was the surprise when it was learned last night Mr. Lyon had laid two charges of embezzlement against Mr. Harvey. The first one is for embezzling the sum of \$200 in April, 1888, and the other charge is for embezzling three different amounts, ranging from \$40 to over \$100 each, from October last. Warrants were issued last night upon these charges, and Harvey was arrested. Afterwards he procured Dr. Lett to go his ball for \$2,000 to appear Tuesday. When, however, the case was called at the police court Mr. Harvey did not appear and a constaeneral esteem and confidence. What, Harvey did not appear and a consta-ble was dispatched to his house to bring him. After half an hour the constable reported that there was no one at Harvey's house. Telegrams were immediately sent out by the police to all the important points in Canada and the border towns in the United States and about 3 30 Chief Randali and Constable Elliott proceeded to Harvey's house on Woolwich street, opposite the Baptist church. The chief found the house locked at both doors, but made his way in through a window. Upstairs the first object on which his eye rested as he turned to the front was Mr. Harvey's fair-haired girl of 12 or 13 years lying on the floor in the front bedroom with her head in a pool of blood by the closet door. The bloody hole in her head at once told the means by which she had met her death. The chief raised the little one's head from its cramped position and stable reported that there was no one at met her death. The chief raised the little one's head from its cramped position and laid it on a pillow. Turning from this awful sight he went through the apper hall and in the back bedroom found the eldest daughter lying beside the bed also stone dead. Horrified the chief went down stairs and in the clothes room of the kitchen found Mrs. Harvey stretched at full length with a similar bullet wound.

On entering the kitchen was seen the table, dishes and spoons and tin containing the unmixed ingredients of a cake, at which Mrs. Harvey had been engaged when called or chased by her husband from the kitchen. The body of the dead woman was lying as it fell. The form was that of a tall, matronly woman of perhaps 40 years. The features were purpled by death, but were regular and prepossessing. The body was lying on its left side with the arms under it. A thin, gausy material had been thrown over it, the raising of which displayed a ragged bullet hole at the back of the head. At the top of the stairs, lying in the door way of a closet off the front bedroom, the body of Gersldine laid with the head resting on a prilow and the white face turned upwards. There was a pool of blood near the pillow, and the right side of the face near the car was torn by a bullet wound. At the back of her head was the death mark of the father's bullet. She was a pretty girl. The body of the eldest girl, tall, slight and girlish, was found lying between the wall and a rude camp bed in a room evidently unused. The face was that of a girl more than merely pretty, with small, regular features. There was blood on the wall and floor where she fell, and her head, too, had the fatal bullet hole in the back of the head. The wounds being in the same places indicate that the murderer must have caught his victims and placed the pistol at their heads. All seem to have fied from him, as there are evidences which go to show that Lillian was disturbed while performing her work upstairs.

TORONTO, March 26.—The Guelph murderer was arrested here this evening by detective Black. He was standing uncon; cornedly on the corner of King and Yonge streets, amoking a cigar when arrested. On his person was found a new five-chambered revolver, with three empty cartridges recently discharged, and two chambers still loaded. He is apparently insane. He had sent a message to his son, who works in the city, asking him to walk down town and stay with him ever night. The son had gone to Guelph on receipt of news of the murder, and the message fell into the hands of the uniter, thus setting them on Harvey's track.

HARVEY'S ANTECEDENTS. Mr. Harvey went to Toronto about aight

stone, formerly manager of the Toronto Bolt Works. It is thought that he had lost most of his savings by the failure of that concern. He was bookkeeper at the works and lived on Winchester-st. After the bolt works' collapse he was for some time in very straightened circumstances, and his bousehold effects were seized by the sheriff. After this he worked in various offices of the city. For about six or eight months he did special work in the office of E. R. C. Clarkson, who found him a hard-working, plodding and competent man. Mr. Clarkson sent him to Gueiph to adjust Mr. Lyon's books, and Mr. Lyon was su much pleased with his ability that he engaged him permanently, and for the past eighteen months he has been in Mr. Lyon's office.

PARLIAMENTARY JOTTINGS.

The Debate on the Jesuit Bill Gemn Col. O'Brien's Amendment. On Tuesday afternoon Mr. O'Brien, on the motion to go into committee of supply, moved the following amendment:-

"That the speaker do not now leave the chair, but that it be resolved that an humble address be presented to his excellency the governorgeneral setting forth: 1st, that this house regards the power of disallowing acts of the legislative assemblies of the provinces vested in his excellency-in-council as a prerogative essential to the national existence of the Dominion. 2nd, that this great power, while it should never be wantonly exercised, should be fearlessly used for the protection of the rights of a minority, for the preservation of the fundamental principles of the constitution, and for safeguarding the general interests of the people. 3rd, that in the opinion of this house the passage of the act by the legislature of the province of Quebec entitithe legislature of the province of Quebec entitied, 'An act respecting the settlement of the Jesuits' Estates,' is beyond the power of that legislature; firstly, because it endows from the public funds a religious organization, thereby violating the unwritten but undoubted constitutional principle of the complete separation of church and state, and of the absolute equality of all denominations before the law; secondly, because it recognizes the usurpation of a right by a foreign authority, namely, his holiness the Pope of Rome, to claim that his censent was necessary to empower the provincial legislature to dispose of a portion of the public domain, and also because the act is made to depend upon the will, and the appropriation thereby made is subject to the control, of the same authority; and thirdly, because the endowment of the Seciety of Jesus, an alien and secret politicoreligious body, the expulsion of which from every Christian community wherein it has had a footing has been rendered necessary by its intolerant and mischievous intermeddling with the functions of civil government, is fraught with danger to the civil and religious liberties of the people of Canada; and this house therefore prays that his excellency will be graciously pleased to disallow the said act."

Mr. O'Brien supported his amendment in a vigorous speech and started the ball rolling nicely. Many prominent speakers on both sides of the house took part in the discussion that followed. Wednesday night Sir John gave notice that he would expect the house to sit in session Thursday until the vote was taken, to which Mr. Mulock replied that he would insist on speaking to the motion, and hoped the government would not try to cut off discussion.
