Consumption in Canada.—At the meeting of the Untario medical association last week Dr. W. T. Atkins, Toronto, read a paper on "The general management of the patient and sick room in Canada." He maintained that Canadians were not so robust generally as old country people on account of the bad ventilation of the houses, particularly during the winter, when stoves consumed the pure air and windows were seldom or ever opened. He deacribed a process of filtering the air and exhibited a piece of gauze or cotton batting to be used process of filtering the air and exhibited a piece of gauze or cotton batting to be used in lieu of the window of the room of a sick or consumptive patient, showing how it prevented the entr-nce of impurities, including smoke and dust. He urges that it was of the utmost importance to have fresh pure air in the sick room.

MAGISTRATE'S COURT.—An interesting case came before Mr. W. Fielding, J.P., on Thursday, the 6th inst., when Mr. W. Eastman appeared to answer the charge preferred by Mr. A. McIntosh of blasphemy and using offensive and insulting language contrary to the laws of the land. Two witnesses were called in support of the charge, the result was a fine of \$5 and costs, amounting to \$4 45... The magistrate took occasion to remark that he was determined to put down the too prevalent abomination of blasphemy and insulting and demoralizing language on our streets, and in this he will have the fullest support of the press and citizens of Minden.

A SAD DRATH.—On Monday morning last the dead body of Mr. Thomas Wabb was found partly submerged in the water of Gull river, close to the Minden bridge, where it is supposed to have fallen about eleven o'clock the previous night. Mr. Wabb was well and favorably known throughout the back country, and in lumbering circles as an upright and inoffensive man, who in his own department of the lumbering business was second to none. His particular infirmity was that he sometimes indulged too freely in intoxicating drinks, but even then he was gentle in disposition and never indulged in irrevernt language, while he was prompt to check reckleseness of speech in his comrades, and we do not suppose he left an enemy behind him in the world. An inquest was held on the body at McKelvey's hotel, Minden, by Dr. W. Glies, coroner, on Tuesday evening. The jury was empannelled and haying viewed the body they adjourned until the following morning. This was to allow the body to be forwarded on the early train to his relatives, who reside within a few miles of Peterborough. After hearing evidence they returned the following verdict:—"That the deceased Thomas Wabb came to his death accidentally by a blow received by falling from or against Minden bridge, and afterwards falling into the river, about the hour of eleven o'clock p.m., on Monday, 3rd June, 1889."—[Echo.

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
