Yearly Meeting at Pickering-An Interteresting Resume of the Proceedings -A Large and Profitable Gathering. [Specially reported for THE POST.]

While the synod assemblies of the various churches have been holding their annual meetings at the provincial capital, at the quiet little village of Pickering, about

The silence was soon broken by J. Mc-Laughlin, followed by Eliza Varney and others, after which the folding doors were closed and the business session began, be-ing presided over by George Barker of Col-lingwood and Arnoldi Haight of Newmar-

ket as clerks.

West Victoria Farmers' Institute.

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
