I would like to obtain full and accurate information in regard to this matter, and if you or any of your readers know of any deaf mute married persons, with or without children, if you or they will kindly send me their addresses I shall feel obliged.

There are deaf children of school age in the province that I have not heard of and I am making an effort to get them into this institution. where they may receive an

institution, where they may receive an education that will fit them for the duties education that will fit them for the duties of life. The condition of an uneducated deaf-mute is more deplorable than that of any other human being. Will you be good enough to help to bring these children to school? You can do more than any other person I might address. The parents of some are not aware that an institution exists where their deaf children can be taught to read and write. There are others who have heard of the institution but are probably not accusated with its real who have heard of the institution but are probably not acquainted with its real character, or from other causes fail to send their children to us; these might be induced by a little effort to send them. Deaf children between the ages of seven and twenty are admitted, educated and bearded at the expense of the province. It is only required that the child shall be of sound mind and that the parents, or the municipality if the parents are unable, pay municipality if the parents are unable, pay the railroad fare and provide necessary clothing.
