The Bath Tub.

The following sensible suggestions we olip from the New England Farmer: A while ago a mother said to me, "Children ought always to be dressed so they sas respect their own clothes." deserves such experience. Will you arrange this pleasure for your son! First try the experiment of a bath room, small, (to be quickly heated), easy of access to one fresh from the cow yard, a tank of water, all hot on the stove for use as soon as the barn work is done, so your noy may take his good clothes into this room, and, in a few minutes, divest himself of all trace and smell of cows, pigs, hens, etc., and come out fresh and clean, invigorated by his bath, ready for his supper and an evening's enjoyment at home or abroad, free from any feeling that his presence may be a nuisance.

New England Opinion. The New England manufacturers are beginning to demand reciprocal trade with Canada. Of late an extraordinary development has taken place in the Southern States. The deposits of coal and iron which lie alongside each other, are being opened, British capital playing part in the process; while the Southern pine lands have at last been reached by the sailroads. In addition, the cotton mills and furniture factories of the south are becoming formidable rivals to those of Massachusetts. Southern iron and lumber are now sold as far north as Chiretain her munufacturing supremacy, to secure the free admission of those articles, and the children: and of other raw material, from Canada. The question of cheap iron is a most important one. The secretary of the American fron and Steel association-a protectionist body—says, in a recent re-port, that since 1878 there have died out of the rolling mills in Maine, 50 percent.; of those in Vermont, 100 per cent.; of those in Massachusetts, 36 per cent.; of those in Connecticut, 20 per cent.; of hose in Rhode Island, 52 per cent. Or. to out the same facts in another form, in 1880 the New England mills produced 170,877 tone of rolled iron and steel; in 1887 they produced 102,711 tons, In these years, therefore, the annual production of folled iron and steel in New England has dwindled 40 per cent. Mean-States at large, increased 57 per cent. These cogent facts leads a protectionist iron maker, Mr. MacFarlin, of South Carver, Mass., to declare in the protectionist Boston Journal, that unless closer trade relations are established with Canada, New England will be compelled before long, to abandon the iron trade to l'ennsylvania and the south. Il s remedy is this: "Right at our doors, in the Canadian provinces, are the finest bitummons coal mines on the continent, and ore beds of surpassing value, which, by removal of the taritt, can be made a priceess been to New England. NO LICENSE AND THE CHILDREN. In Plainfield, N. J., where, until this rear, there have been about a dozen "highcense" liquor saloons and hotels paying \$500 license fee, now, through a disagreement among the liquor men, together with the opposition in the city council to all icenses, none are granted for the current year. The saloons have been closed un for three months. The Children's Home, or Plainfield, held its twelfth anniversary refollowing significant paragraphs concern

As an association we wish to bear our testimony to the marked difference in the number of cases where we have been called to interfere in behalf of ill-used children, as well as to take children from wretched houses, since our common council refused to license the liquor shope

and selectes.

While misfortune and sickness may always make care for children needful, fully nine-tenths of all cases received in our home have come from the curse of the drink habit in our city.

LIQUOR WAS THE CAUSE. The superintendent at Johnstown of the Edison Electric Light Works, Mr. Austin S. Hatch, who, with his wife, had a narrow escape during the flood, is reported se saving that no less than 3,000 lives were lost at Johnstown through the use of liquor. "The loss of life that may properly be charged to liquor," he says, "happen ed in this way. After the lower portion of the town had been inundated by the heavy rains, and the people had been driven to the second floor, large numbers of men left their houses on rafts and plundered the alloons. By three o'clock in the afternoon there were certainly 1,000 men drunk and calling around the streets, and when the flood came they were dazed and helpless. They were unable to save themselves, and They were unable to save themselves, and caught upon and dragged others down. Besides, their families were alone and powerless to save themselves from the flood. Had the men been sober and at home, many families would have been saved." If this account of the added devastation, in connection with the Johnstown horror, on account of strong drink, be true, the awful magnitude of the drink peril was never more strikingly exhibited.
