The London correspondent of the New York Times cables: The week's events in London have been almost as sobering in their way as was the original Traislast equate affair of not three years ago. The biggest strike which the metropolis has ever known came upon us simoet se swiftand inconsequent outbreak of mob fury, and the situation which it has created in sa startling in its suggestiveness. In the number of men who went out on strike, counting both the original stevedores and the longehoremen and the workers in more of less collateral lines who struck out of sympathy, there must at amaximum have been 110,000 men. This huge mass of humanity, an equivalent perhaps to the total number of satult bread-winners in Boston and Baltimore combined, had been living for years tolling and groaning under its burdens within a short 'bus ride of the Bank of England, and vet had been no more reparted or even recognised by fashionable and middle-class London than if it lived on the other side of the globe. That these hundred thousand men were That these hundred thousand men were overworked, underpaid and generally tyrannised over by a big combination of shipping and dock companies was a fact which was never mentioned west of the Mansion House. London talked about outrages in Armenia, and even grew mildly excited over oppression in Crets, but about the grievances of the dock laborers at its own door not a syllable was ever dreamed of. Suddenly and without warning the colosses strike came. London for a day of two failed curiously to realize its a day of two failed curiously to realize its magnitude and took the matter neacha-lantly. Then it became impossible longer to ignore the portentous fact, for some-thing like a state of siege set in. Butter, milk, eggs, sich and similar perishable commodities began searing up in price.
