The facts of the case are that no pupils need remain any longer in one of our forms than four weeks if he can prove to ue that he can do higher work than the form he belongs to, and in order that they may have an opportunity of doing this we hold promotion examinations every week. I promotion examinations every week. I doesn it very important that the pupils of the county should know that this is the the county should know that this is the real state of affairs in the Lindsay collegiate institute. The other inference that the high school teachers prefer their own case and comfort to the welfare of the rural schools of the county, I dismiss with this single remark that as the success of the high schools depends very largely on the efficiency of the rural schools an injury to them would be very soon felt in the high schools. I feel certain that your inspector did not mean to do any injury to the institute, and I trust that before he again touches upon high school matters he will give them a little consideration and he perfectly sure of his statements.
