The mechanic in the cities and towns, the farmer, the fichermen, the storekeeper's clerk, in short, all of us who use cotton sheets or wear cotton shirts, have now to pay an exorbitant tax upon them for the benefit, not of the badly-paid cotton hands, but of the men who have invested their money in the mills. There are about 300 of these persons as compared with at least three million wearers of cotton, who, owing to the manner in which the duty is levied, have to pay the heaviest tax on the cheapest stuff, besides submitting to the exactions of a combine, If Lowell cotton is a better and cheaper article than that made in Canada, by all means let us have it. Its free admission will not affect Canadian labor injuriously, for we must pay for our importations, and the only conceivable thing we can pay with, since we do not grow gold as a crop, is Canadian products

Sir John and his colleagues are naturally averse to entering upon a policy which might, and probably would, injure some of the exotic industries whose votes and money are useful at election times list they cannot hope to resist the forces that are making for the establishment of free trade between the two countries. Fighting nature and the conomic laws has always been a losing and in the end an impossible undertaking.

An Illustration to the Point.

The Times has often shown that all trade is a species of exchange or barter, and that our imports are really paid for by our exports. That is to say, if Canula meporta certain manufactures or articles from a foreign country, she pays for these by exchanging something else which she has manufactured, raised, or obtained, although the exchange may not be direct or even immediate. The protectionists. on the contrary, argue that every import is a loss to the trade of industries of the country, as it supplies something which might have been manufactured at home, and the manufacture of which is loss to our manufacturors, forgetting that we have to give other manufactures or produce in exchange- something which we can manufacture or produce to better advantage than we could that which we import. Porhaps the matter may be rendered more clear by a practical exemplifiention of the truth given by the Bowmanville Sun. It says: The other day s Canadian tiem deposited in a bank in Toronto a certain sum of money to pay for railway supplies ordered by cable from England. The next day word was received that the goods had been shipped; and two hours later a despatch came to the bank stating that the English house had drawn upon it for the amount at its credit to pay a Quebec lumberman for a shipment of lumber which it had ordered. This meident furnishes a neat proof of the fact that international trade is simply process of exchange, product being given for product, to the mutual advantage of both parties to the transaction. Once this truth is grasped, the protectionist superstition that imports tend to impoverish us crumbles to pieces.
