Dundas & Flavelle Bros. THE CANADIAN POST. LOCAL MATTERS. LINDSAY TOWN COUNCIL. REGULAR MEETING - COMMUNICATIONS - ELECTRIC LIGHT FOR THE EAST WARD REPORTS - WATER-WORKS SYSTEM DISCUSSED. Monday evening the town aldermen assembled in the council chamber at 8 o'clock and quickly settled down to business. Present: Mayor Walters, Reeve Crandell, Dep.-reeve Williams and Ray, and Couns. Fleury, Touchburn, Parsons, Brown, Ross, Comstock, Deas, Fee and Bryans. Minutes of last two meetings were read by the clerk Mr. J. B. Knowlson, and confirmed. COMMUNICATIONS. From F. Crandell, referring to a balance of \$65 due him on his gravel contract, the chairman of streets and bridges committee objecting to quality of a portion of the gravel. - Referred to the streets and bridges committee. From J. A. Barron, referring to joint assessment of firm, and stating his objection to being assessed on income as well. - Referred to finance committee. From D. Sinclair and Chas. 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CHARLES D. BARR, PROPRIETOR.

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The Adjourned Meeting. At eight o'clock Tuesday evening the members of the council were in their places and all the seats in the body of the chamber were occupied by the leading citizens of the town, while a number were invited into the gallery. Mayor Walters occupied the chair, and lost no time in calling upon Mr. Hadden, who, with Mr. Andrews, represented the water-works committee. Mr. Hadden again read the draft of proposed amendments to the previous evening. Put concisely the proposal was as follows: The company would be called "The Lindsay Waterworks Company," and the capital stock would be placed at \$100,000; five miles of pipe would be laid and fifty hydrants placed as council directed, for which the annual rental would be \$2,500, the charge for additional water to be \$45 each; the water to be at all times guaranteed. For the present \$100,000 in stock would be left as it is until the system had been tried and accepted. The put in would be capable of supplying a city of 5,000 inhabitants. The water being intended for domestic as well as fire purposes, would be of pronounced pure and wholesome by the quality of the water. The water would be pumped into a stand pipe erected on high ground, and the power would be sufficient to raise the water to a height of 400 feet. Free water would be furnished for street watering purposes and for flushing the sewers; also for watering lawns, fountains, etc. A number of those present were anxious to know where the company proposed to get the water. Mr. Hadden stated that the water and the question was put to Mr. Hadden, that gentleman replied that the question had not yet been considered; it might be taken from Lake Simcoe, so far as he knew. Careful and serious consideration would have to be made before the source of supply could be determined. What he did know was that the water, wherever obtained, would be of pronounced pure by the board of health of the province. Town Solicitor HOPKINS enquired if it was known how much the present system cost the town annually. Mayor WALTERS said he had made an estimate of the cost of the present system of hose and firemen's salaries. The cost was as follows: 1894, \$768; 1895, \$2,257; 1896, \$1,887; 1897, \$2,123; average, \$1,554.80. These amounts included cost of Worthington pump and other plant, which it was proposed to charge to capital account. Subtracting these amounts and capital interest and depreciation charges left an average of about \$1,300 for a fifteen hydrant system. Mr. DEACON alluded to the inefficiency of the present system, and said that though he had worked for its protection afforded commercial interest and convenience to the town, he was sorry to find that the water was not being used for its proper purposes. Pure water could be got from the rocky bed of the back country, but in an agricultural district the drainage was seldom pure, besides there was a possibility that the dam at Lindsay might be taken away and the supply of water cut off. Mr. HADDEN said if Seouge water was decided upon and the dam was not in opposition, some streams could still flow into the channel. If it was not a bad thing for the town, it would be a good thing to supply good water if they were compelled to cut a channel from Lake Ontario to do so. Mr. HOPKINS said he would make a calculation while the discussion was going on. The cost of the present system to the taxpayers would be 50 cts per \$1,000 of assessment, the cost of the waterworks system, 75 hydrants, would be \$120,000. The present system cost was vitally necessary, and he was of the opinion that the town had made a first class offer. Mr. DEAN said the present system cost about \$1,600 for fifteen hydrants; for about \$1,000 more the town would gain 35 hydrants placed so as to cover most of the town. A communication was then read from the Waterworks Co. Brantford asking council if possible not to close an agreement to waterworks until their representative could make an offer. It was finally decided that the question should be referred to a joint committee composed of members of the council, board of trade and citizens to be reported on next week. Mr. DUNDAS advised careful procedure, and thought the tariff of charges should be thoroughly examined; he thought them too high for the town. Mr. SYMINGTON took action against them before a Magnetawan magistrate, and sent his brother along with Constable Kennedy. Shortly afterwards the waterworks company was notified that the owners arrived and were detained by Symington until his return. They were taken back by team to Magnetawan for trial.

On motion the council went into committee on the whole by-law No. 531, appointing Bowman Brown as a member of the council for a term of one year, to date from 1st July, 1899; and by-law No. 532, appointing Frederick Knudson to the position of town clerk and treasurer, made vacant by the resignation of Mr. Knowlson, bonds to the amount of \$20,000 to be furnished. Exception was taken to the appointment of Mr. Knudson to the position of town clerk, and the reading of the by-law was deferred until the matter had been further considered. By-law No. 532 was given a third reading, and received the official seal.
