Why should we not say a good word for the Canadian hen? Among the products of Canadian farms which the United States want are barley, horses, hay, wool and sheep. Our American cousins buy millions of dozens of Canadian-built eggs every year. There is no duty on eggs, and the Canadian hen puts forth her best efforts in order to keep up the reputation of her native land. The Canadian hen is one of the most useful and necessary of creatures, and in its quiet way is doing more to bring about a reciprocity treaty with the United States than the whole Dominion cabinet put together, and it is showing our neighbors the practical advantages that would flow from the making of a reciprocal trade arrangement between the two countries. No patriotic citizen can afford to throw a stone at the Canadian hen. It teaches a lesson in unsesuming energy and strict attention to business that place it in the front rank of native producers. And as for the Canadian rooster, he is a perfect gentleman. -Dundas True Banner.

English Capital and Canadian Iron Mining.

The Iron and Coal Trades Review of London, Eng., writes in a recent issue of the large investment of British capital that is being made in the United States just now. It says that within the past six months over \$100,000,000 of British money (twenty million stg.) has been expended in the purchase of American iron and steel works, breweries, distilleries and cotton mills. This is over and above the sums invested in railroad and other securities. The Review then says : "It does seem curious that our colonies, which certainly offer magnificent fields for the investor, should be completely ignored by the enterprising capitalists who are now so anxious to buy up profitable American industrial concerns. Canada will readily give 'all the 'protection' that these investors may think necessary, but the Dominion seems to have been overlooked by these grand operators, and at present it would appear as if that country were destined to be developed by "American instead of British capital." The Dominion has been overlooked simply because it would not pay a British of any other capitalist to invest his money in any of the natural industries of Canada. There is an immense quantity of the finest iron ore in the Kinmount range-an inexhaustible supply for a dozen big concerns. Suppose British capital took hold of it, what could it do with the ore? It could not hip it to England. The United States the only available market, and Canadian ore is excluded by a duty of 75 cents per ton. In other words, if the mine produced 1,000 tons a day the ordipary expenses and the cost of transportation to Mew England furnaces would be enhanced by a charge of \$700 a day. which, of itself, would eat up the prospect of a dividend. If the British apitalists should determine to smelt the ore themselves they would have to fetch the coal from Nova Scotia, and then, when pig-iron had been produced, pay the United States a duty of \$6.72 per long ton on that article. This would effectually dissipate the profits on their pay-iron. Nor would British capital VALUABLE FARM PROPERTY and it very advantageous to purchase Canadian factories. The Canadian market is limited, and though the tariff en-ables the manufacturers to make exorbi taut profits on their output, it prevents them from making sales abroad.
