Electric Light. Last Saturday evening the first trial of the electric light took place, and proved eminently successful, taking into consideration the fact that the lamps were not in position until a few hours previous to starting up. The system used is known as the Bell system, and Mr. Ross, who has purchased the plant, will run under the title of The Lindsay Electric Light Company. Some objection has been raised that the light was not up to 1,000 candle-power standard, but this is explained by the fact that Mr. Ross could not at the time obtain sufficiently powerful dynamo. The regular monthly meeting of the Lindsay Board of Education was held Tuesday evening in the council chamber, and the session proved a lengthy one. Members present: Messrs. A. Haggroth, chairman; J. Deacon, J. D. MacMurphy, H. Smyth, A. O'Say, J. Kennedy, T. Stewart and J. H. McNeill. The minutes of former meeting were read by the secretary, Mr. Spier, and on motion approved. Principal Flayton of the Collegiate Institute, reported as follows: "Students attendance, 125 average; fee collected for the month, \$1,200, which is an improvement on the previous year." Principal Flayton's report on the public schools was a total of 774 and an average of 75. Attendance was directed in the report in the very few absentees. In many cases no satisfactory reasons being given by pupils. The board was informed that the school was in the midst of the progress of the school, and the board was asked to enforce the school law by meeting the matter at the commencement of the new year. A communication from Mr. Stevens, acting master, was read, asking that his salary be increased to \$100 per year, and stating that when engaged he had been led to expect a bonus. It referred to finance committee. Communications were also read from the Messrs. Dix, Mac, Allen, A. Ward, Keith, L. Sharp and Allen, asking for an increase of salary.
