WHOSE TURN NEXT?

THE LAMBTON VICTORY.

The electors of Lambton have given an inexpectedly hearty approval of the Mowat administration and a crushing condemnation of tory tactics by returning Mr. Chas. Mackenzie with the splendid majority of 660. The third party candidate appeared in the field, but with indifferent success, considering the extraordinary means taken to roll up a large vote in his favor. Rev. Dr. Sutherland of Toronto stumped the riding, but failed to draw out the votes for his candidate. The tory candidate had Mr. Birmingham, the tory organizer, from Toronto, appealing to the Orangemen, and as he is a grand official it was expected his appeals would have great weight. On the other hand. it is said, a forged document was circulated among the Roman Catholics, with the hope of getting them to vote largely for Fleck. But the trick failed; and its timely exposure made it a destructive

answer to the charges recklessly made against the Mowat ministry, and it is a decided condemnation of the wicked and inpatriotic policy that would excite class against class and stir up religious differences. The Mowat government have been charged with cowardice, and with being afraid of the people, because most of its members addressed the electors of Lambton during the election campaign. The charge is groundless. The ministers were attacked, and they promptly and fearlessly went before the people; made explanation and defence; invited criticism, and calmly awaited the popular verdict. That is the proper course to take under our representative institutions. The people replied not only with a renewed expression of confidence, but they gave it the emphasis of a largely


