November Session—A Busy Time.—The council resumed Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. The warden laid before the council a resolution passed by the council of Woodville relative to the necessity that exists for the services of a junior judge in the county of Victoria. Referred to the committee on appointment to office.

EDUCATION REPORT.
Dr. VROOMAN, chairman, introduced the report of the education committee, which was read in committee of the whole, Mr. Stacek in the chair, and adopted as follows:—

Your committee have had under consideration a communication from the secretary of the Victoria Education Board, relative to the proposed department of public schools, which was passed by the council in June last, providing for the discontinuance of the school in the town of the Oakwood high school. Your committee recommend that the clerk be instructed to inform the minister of education that the school of the Oakwood high school be discontinued, notwithstanding the fact that a high school clerk should be formed as a part of the township of Mariposa.
