-The New England iron manufacturers gave their views on the tariff to the congressional committee of ways and means Friday. Most of them favored the abolition of the duty on Canadian coal or reciprocity in that product.

—It is feared that the winter crops of cereals in Southern Russia will be destroyed by want of snow. The ground, which is ordinarily covered by three or four feet of snow at this season of the year, is bare entirely, while the temperature is even lower than detail.

-There is an outbreak of diphtheria at Zanesville, Ohio, which bide fair to develop into a terrible epidemic. It is said that a Chicago physician issued a false certificate as to the death of a child, whose remains were shipped from Chicago to Zanesville, and infected people there with diphtheria.

The authorities of New York still continue to cut the electric light wires. Edison says that lighting can be conducted at a minimum of danger by using a current not strong enough to do any harm to human beings, and suggests that the law should prohibit the use of a current that is strong enough to take human life.

-During the performance at the opera-house on Tuesday evening an accident to the Madrid electric lighting machinery caused a panic, a cry of fire having been raised. By the efforts of the matager the starm was checked, and the audience dispersed quietly. The Queen Regent and the Infanta Isabel were in the royal box and remained standing during the commo-tion, and were the last to leave the house.

-A snowstorm in Boston the other day —A snowstorm in Boston the other day afforded an opportunity of testing the respective merits of horse cars and electric cars under such circumstances. The horse cars were delayed until four horses could be attached to each car. The electric cars were not delayed in the least. -Naval circles in London are very much -Naval circles in London are very much disturbed at the reports of the successful triaf of Lieut. Paral's torpedo boat in the Bay of Cadiz, in view of the presence of a number of England's best war ships in Porrugese waters. Submerged to the depth of 40 feet the boat easily made six knots an hour, and answered the requirements of her guiding apparatus as readily as though she were floating on the surface.

-A man named Tykle kept baths for the cure of paralysis and other maladies at Kokomo, Ind. A well to do farmer named Clarke took a course for paralysis. Tykle put him in a hot bath, left the gase burning under the boiler, and went to bed, forgetting all about his helpless patient. The next morning Clarke was found in the tub dead, having been literally boiled to death. Tykle is in jail.

-The condition of three of the little girls who were burned in the Tilden school fire, Detroit, is still critical, with the chances much greater that they will die than live. The only one of the remaining four of those seriously burned who is pro-nounced out of danger is Lucy Renshaw. The sufferers whose lives are in danger are Georgie Horner, Edna Fonda and Bessie Bamford.

-An indictment has been found against an electrician, who was the superintendent of the eystem that killed a salesman in New York, and personal responsibility having thus been brought home to one of the men engaged in electric lighting the dangers of the existing system have been modified to an appreciable extent. The position of the electric light companies in New York is simply this: they can no longer operate their systems unless they remove the element of danger entirely, and now that this has been settled it will not be long before they do so.



Plans and Descriptions from Carpentry and Building. Here is a condensation of the matter ac companying the drawings of one of the prize




Building. The author of the design in this case is Mr. Edward W. Smith, of Jamaica


