

In a five-minute address Mayor Smyth then referred to some of the matters that would come before the council—one of which would be the question of examptions from taxation. Reparding finance matters be had been handed a statement during the afternoon that was somewhat minimating, and it was seen you has the new council should know just how they stood at starting. It was not his intenting to throw any refection upon the retising council; that bedy

had reduced the expenditure and deserved credit for having done so. The waterworks contract, he understood, would come before them again for some adjustment. Another matter that would demand their attention situated in a rich agricultural district possessed a fine market and derived a large revenue from fees. An effort should be made to remove the clog on Lindsay's progress in this direction. Referring to the question of sewerage, Mayor Smith said any financier acquainted with the position of the town would readily admit the impossibility of entering upon any work that would increase the debenture debt of the town. A Correct Statement Respecting the Reported Irregularities. [Toronto Mail, Jan. 16th.]

During the past two weeks rumours have been current of irre . ularity in the books of the Toronto branch of the Ontario bank. and of questionable conduct on the part of two local officials. A highly exaggerated and sensational statement of the case has been published, and it was supposed by many that the bank would certainly lose a considerable sum. The facts of the case, which have been secured from an undoubted source, are as follows, and may be relied upon as absolutely correct.

A few days ago the inspector of the bank reported to Mr. Holland, the general manager that there were some inaccuracies in

reported to Mr. Holland, the general manager, that there were some inaccuracies in the books of Mr. Harvey Brown, the ledger keeper of the Toronto branch of the bank, which is under the immediate charge of Mr. Smith, as local manager. He reported that Mr. Brown had not taken off his balthat Mr. Brown had not taken off his balance sheet of the individual or deposit ledger, and that he appeared indifferent as to whether he did or not. Farther, that the account of the branch, Mr. "Rolly' Moffat, should have have seen this duty performed. Mr. Holland at once ordered Brown before him, and having heard the charges corroborated, suspended him on the spot, and appointed another official to balance the deposit ledger. Mr. Moffat then informed the general manager that he believed some of the accounts were incorrect, in fact two of them were overdrawn, believed some of the accounts were incorrect, in fact two of them were overdrawn, when the general manager instantly suspended Moffat also, believing him to have been remise in his duty in not before reporting Brown's irregularities. Mr. Holland then placed the whole matter in the hands of the solicitors of the bank, who will take immediate steps to protect the bank's interests. The parties whose accounts were overdrawn are amply responbank's interests. The parties whose accounts were overdrawn are amply responsible for the amount of the over-draft, and the bank holds bonds of the Guarantee Company for any losses which may result from negligence or default of the officials, so that no loss can possibly result to the bank or its shareholders. These are the simple facts of the case, and anything beyond what appears in the foregoing may be reparded as purely sensational.
