—Another of our venerable and worthy pioceer farmers has passed away in the person of John Campbell, senr.. of North Maripose, father of the well-known stock-raiser. He died at the homestead on the 17th January at the age of eighty-six years and two months. He was born in Isle of Skye, Scotland, in 1803, and emigrated it to this country in 1830. He came to the farm in North Mariposa in the fall of that year, and resided on the same place until death. Two brothers and one sister followed him to this country and settled within a short distance of each other. Only one—a brother—survives him. His family comprises three sons and six daughters, all of whom were married and whose homes were but a few miles apart with the exception of the eldest daughter, who resided in Bruce county. The three sons and four daughters are survivors. In religion the deceased was a staunch Presbyterian. He was a member of the Woodville Presbyterian congregation since its establishment and an elder of its first seesion, having been ordained by the late Dr. Burns forty years ago. In politics he was reform in principle, but never took an active part, as he did not favor the extremes to which partylem too often led people. As a parent he was kind and sympathetic. As a neighbor and friend he was ever ready to "rajdice with those that rejoiced and weep with those who wept." During his nearly sixty years career in this country by his quiet, unassuming life his influence always tended towards peace and harmony. With age and infirmity his patience and calm Christian resignation became more and more apparent, so that the closing years of his life were years of peaceful, happy contentment, a beautiful ending of a peaceful, well-spent life. So passed away one of Mariposa's first settlers. Though Monday was very stormy the funeral was largely attended.
