

asked by one of the directors of the G.T.R. library if the board would have any objection to granting the use of convocation hall for an entertainment to be held shortly in aid of that institution...The proposal received considerable discussion, and the consensus of opinion was to the effect that the board had not power to grant the request, besides, it would be a precedent that would lead to trouble in the future.

COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE MATTERS. Principal Harstone presented his report for the month of January, which dealt with a number of matters calculated to affect the welfare of the institution. The total number of pupils on the roll is 292; young ladies, 136; young men. 156; of these 132 belong to the town and 112 to the county; outside counties, 48; new pupils this term, 120; average attendance for month, 222; fees collected, \$240. The report stated that the rooms were over-crowded and that the engagement of an extra teacher until the holidays was the only way out of the difficulty. Next term the attendance would have to be limited to a certain number. Some 110 students are at present taking third class work...The report was discussed at some length, and it was agreed upon that an additional teacher was necessary for the balance of the present term. The secretary was ac-cordingly instructed to advertise for an eighth master qualified for general junior
