The iletin in question dealt most compre hensively with the question of barley, and the lesson it was intended to teach is ohvious. If we cannot reasonably expect to go on selling our six rowed barley to the Americane, and an opening for millione of bushels of two rowed barley exists in Great Britain, the part of wisdom is to substitute the variety wanted in England for the variety now in general cultivation here. Two reasons in chief show that such a change would be of the greatest advantage to our farmers. In the first place the two-rowed variety of barley is more productive than the six-rowed, and in the second place the former brings, on an average about twice as much in the liritish market as does the six rowed now grown and exported to the United States. Fresuming that our farmers would promptly take the steps suggested by the bulletin in changing from six rowed to two rowed barley, the question arose as to how the best seed could be had. On this point Frof. Maunders says:

From what has been said as to the absolute necessity of having the two-rowed barley unmixed if it is to command a the Americans, and an opening for millions

The quantity of pure seed now available at the several experimental farms is probably sufficient to give to every farmer who will apply for it a three-pound nample. If this quantity is carefully and early sown on a good piece of land, well prepared, the average return is not likely to fall much below two bushels, and with two bushels of purs seed available for the apring of 1891—sufficient to sow an acre or more every possessor of such barley will probably have from 25 to 40 bushels availprobably have from 25 to 40 bushels available for sowing in the spring of 1892, and with a little extra care I am convinced that the yield could be made to exceed this estimate. In this way a practical solution of the difficulty of supplying Canadian barley growers with good seed of pure two-rowed barley would be had, and from that time forward two-rowed barley could be grown in large quantities for the English market. 
